

2019 NAPLAN Tests Important Information for Parents/Carers

The NAPLAN (National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy) for 2019 for Year 7 and 9 students will be held on **Tuesday 14 May, Wednesday 15 May and Thursday 16 May**. NAPLAN tests seek to measure student performance standards across writing, reading, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.



The results of the NAPLAN tests provide information for students, parents and the College. Testing data is used to inform teaching programs leading to improved student achievement.

All students (Years 7 and 9) are expected to participate in NAPLAN tests. During test week, catch-up tests will be available for individuals who are absent on test days.

Support can be arranged for students with disabilities if the student uses similar support for classroom tasks.

Exemptions may be granted to students with significant intellectual disabilities and to students who have been learning English for less than one year. Parental consent is required before exemptions can be granted. Students may be withdrawn from NAPLAN by the parent or carer. This is a matter of consideration by parents and carers in consultation with the school. If, after consultation, you decide to withdraw your child, you must sign a Student Withdrawal form. These forms are available at the school (from Mr Peter Wright) and must be signed by **Monday 6 May.**

Later in the year, you will receive your child's personal NAPLAN report. The report will describe your child's particular



results from the Reading, Writing, Spelling, Language Conventions and Numeracy testing. The report will also show how your child performed in relation to Australian minimum standards.

I am confident that the information you receive as a result of your child's participation in NAPLAN tests will be valuable in helping you assess your son's progress in literacy and numeracy. You can also be assured that the College uses NAPLAN data to help inform its Teaching and Learning program.

Building Resilient Young Men

The term 'resilience' is one of those buzz words that has been floating around educational circles for a number of years now, but what does it really mean? The ability to be resilient is defined as the capacity to recover quickly from difficulties – basically it is the ability to bounce back from adversity. A skill or quality that all of us, especially our boys, should be trying to develop as we grow.



There aren't too many things in life that we can truly guarantee, however, unfortunately, one thing that we know for sure is that we are all going to face tough times at some point. As human beings, we are naturally going to be tested by such difficulties, with such unfortunate circumstances having the potential to have a significant impact on our individual wellbeing. We know that how we overcome such challenges is so important, but where we sometimes get lost is navigating how we do this. How do we strengthen our own levels of resilience and find ways to bounce back from difficult periods in our lives?

At a recent professional development seminar that I attended, Hugh Van Cuylenburg from *The Resilience Project* discussed three important factors in growing resilience; gratitude, empathy and mindfulness. In taking proactive steps to improve these qualities we can improve our ability to be resilient. For example, if we take a few minutes before the end of each day to list three things that went well for us, we are practicing gratitude, if we do a random act of kindness once a week, we are improving our ability to empathise with others and if we go about each day by being aware of where we presently are, we are being mindful. I will certainly be trying to take a few minutes out of my day to do these things so that I can improve my levels of resilience. I hope parents, students and families find the time to do so too.

Valdocco (Year 9)

Lessons in Life from Author, Mark Smith

Last year, the Valdocco English Team, in consultation with the College's English Leader and other experienced English staff, sat down to discuss the introduction of a new text for Term 1, 2019. This changing of the literary guard often leads to healthy discussions around strong characters, important themes to explore and how to link the text to the outside world. Enter Mark Smith's 2016 novel, *The Road to Winter*.

A tale of a young teenager's struggle for survival in a post-apocalyptic and unforgiving Australian landscape, "The Road to Winter" hits a range of birds with one well-crafted stone. When choosing a new text for our compact and cohesive English curriculum, our criteria was based around strong female

characters, a clear and defined Australian voice, and an explicit and almost palpable link to the great outdoors. Mark Smith's text covered these points comprehensibly, wrapping it all up in a relatable storyline about a teenage boy trying to find himself in a changing world. A perfect match.

To cap off the profound impact the text has made on our staff and students alike, we were fortunate enough to have Mark Smith visit our campus last week, and needless to say, his story was enthralling. Mark was gracious enough to take his captivated audience on the journey through his extraordinary life, and enlighten us on how he came to write *The Road to Winter*. and achieve his subsequent successes. As with all





accomplished writers, neatly woven throughout each snippet of adventure and excitement, was a poignant and heartfelt life lesson.

Mark began his address to the boys with his brush with death, breaking his neck, not once, but twice as a teen, both almost fatally. What on the surface seemed like a boyhood tale of mischief and risk taking, led perfectly to the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow: the discovery of his love for reading. Given his paralysis whilst in hospital recovering, the teenage Mark was forced to read, as it was the only thing he *could* do. Ironically, this lack of choice led to him falling in love with books and sparked the inspiration for his own series of short stories, and eventually, "The Road to Winter".

Aside from the perfect miracles and powerful teachings that magically revealed themselves throughout Mark's life, what stood out most was his humble nature and his range of interests. This particular audience was captivated by his broad taste and love of footy, the outdoors and reading and writing; a previously bewildering thought for our lively bunch. He spoke of reading and writing novels, just as he spoke of surfing waves and riding horses, full of wonder and excitement. This is the way to get students to read and write, by showing them that beauty can be found in anything, all we have to do is look for it and know it when we see it.

Year 10



Since our great success at the ACC Swimming Carnival earlier this term, there have been numerous students across all year levels, representing the College proudly at a number of ACC Sport events.

ACC Athletics Carnival

The annual ACC Athletics Carnival is always a feature event in the school year. The world-class Lakeside Stadium in Albert Park, is the perfect venue to showcase the outstanding athletic talent on display from each of the competing ACC member schools. Having finished 3rd in 2017 and a close 2nd last year, we were hopeful in 2019 of producing our strongest performance at an ACC Athletics Carnival.

There were, as always, many fantastic individual performances on the day. Year 12 student, Gabriel De Wet, completed six years of dominance in inter-school competition, securing 1st Place in both the Shot Put and Discus events. Our High Jump competitors also performed strongly with Mitchell Giddens (U15) and Mac Andrew (U16) winning their age groups, while Lachlan Monteath (U14) and Jason Le (U16) won their Long Jump events. Kai Barnes in the U15 Shot Put and Jake Freeman in the U16 Discus capped off strong performances by our athletes in the Field with their 1st Place results. On the track, Troy Maggs ran strongly to finish 1st in Division 2 in the 1500m event, while U13 runner Mitchell Gamel and U17 athlete Tom Gasparroni claimed terrific victories in their grueling 400m races. Our





U17 4x100m Relay Team involving Tom Gasparroni, Joshua Woodford, Riley Light and Jay Stephan, continued their relay dominance with a powerful win in their race.

With the results tallied at the conclusion of the 74 events, it was Salesian College that claimed the Division 2 title. We would have to settle for a worthy 2nd place result, comfortably clear of Mazenod who finished in 3rd. Although we were hoping to hold the Premiership Cup aloft at the end of the day, all team members should be incredibly proud of their individual performances and this terrific team result.

ACC Triathlon

This year's ACC Triathlon Event was held at Elwood Beach on Sunday 3 March, as part of the Victorian All Schools Triathlon Championships. Perfect conditions greeted our 22 competitors as they arrived on the beach at 6.30am, looking forward to the rewarding challenge that Triathlon provides. With a number of our team members competing in their first Triathlon, the anticipation was evident as the race start approached.

Our students entered two of the ACC race categories on the day, with ten athletes competing in the Individual Short Course event (200m swim, 10km ride, 2km run) and nine athletes comprising three teams that each completed a leg of the Team Long Course event (400m swim, 10km ride, 4km run). Our final team of three Year 7 students entered the Junior Team Short Course race.

Languages

"It is known that Australia offers an incredible mixture of cultures and languages from all around the world. This is something unique and beautiful that makes this country the 'place to be'. It is not a surprise that the number of migrants wishing to settle here increases every year. "Overseas migration is now the main driver of [the population growth in Australia], making up about 64 per cent of it (2017)" https://www.aph.gov.au/About_Parliament/Parliamentary_Departments/Parliamentary_Library/pubs/rp/rp1819/Quick_Guides/PopulationStatistics



I recently passed the Australian Citizenship test, developed by the Department of Home Affairs. I am now able to attend the official ceremony to become a 'true Aussie' in this gorgeous country. I was pleased to see that two of the questions in the citizenship test were in regards to languages. One, quite obviously, was about the official language in Australia. The other one, however, was more interesting: how many languages are currently spoken in Australia?

There were three choices: 50, 100 and more than 200. The latter was the correct one, but the fact that this question was one of the 20 required by the citizenship test amused me, along with some others about the Governor-General, the two Houses of the Parliament and the rights and duties of every Australian citizen.

Nelson Mandela used to say "Without language, one cannot talk to people and understand them; one cannot share their hopes and aspirations, grasp their history, appreciate their poetry, or savour their songs". Language, in any of its forms, is intrinsic to our human nature; since we are born we have the desire to communicate and we soon develop ways to do it. The word *communicate* derives from the Latin word *communicare*, which is composed by *cum* (with) and *munis* (perfoming services or duties) and refers to the social value of this skill, which does not work if there is not someone who receives and understands what is communicated. The ability to communicate is essential for us to express ourselves but also to understand the people and the world around us.

This is why, in 2019, all primary and secondary schools in Victoria are required to offer a language from Prep to Year 8.

"Languages education offers significant benefits for Victorian students, their families and communities. At school, it helps our children and young people to develop their first language literacy, problemsolving, intercultural and communication skills, and it equips them for a wide range of careers. More broadly, it contributes to social cohesion, underpins Victoria's increasingly globalised and export-oriented economy and enables speakers of the languages to maintain or reclaim their languages."

(The Hon. Martin Dixon, MP Minister for Education, The Victorian Government's Vision for Languages Education, 2011)

At St Joseph's College we help our boys, not just to gain the knowledge and skills that will prepare them for their future career, but also to develop into a citizen of the world. Learning a language is a vital step of this process. We do not expect our boys to finish Year 8 and be fluent in a second language, but we expect them to have an open mind and 'ear' towards what is different around them and far away. This is something really important nowadays for the current and new generations.

This is why we celebrate Harmony Day on Thursday 21 March. This is why we encourage the families of our community to participate in events around Melbourne that celebrate multiculturalism, cultures and languages, such as foreign film festivals and food festivals. We are very lucky to live in such a vibrant city like Melbourne, and in such a vibrant country like Australia. I feel so privileged to live here.
