The Feast of Saint Maria Domenica Mazzarello

The Feast of Saint Maria Domenica Mazzarello was celebrated on Monday 13 May. In 1852, at the age of 15, Maria joined the Daughters of Mary Immaculate. As the Industrial Revolution changed the landscape of Europe, Mary opened a dressmaking shop for young women. She taught them the skills for survival in the

everyday world, the power of prayer and the love of God. Mary's practical and spiritual approach to ministry was noticed by Don Bosco. In 1872 Don Bosco, together with Mary Mazzarello, founded the Salesian Sisters, the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians. This inspired ministry for the education of young women complemented Don Bosco's commitment to young men. By the time of her death in 1881, Mary had established a style of education grounded in enlightened catechesis. In 1951, Pope Pius XII canonised her. Today's Daughters of Mary Help of Christians reflect their founder's joyful self-giving, her sincere humility, her responsibility in work, and her austerity in life. The Salesian Sisters have a community close by us in Scoresby and are an important part of the Salesian story at St Joseph's College.

Exams are Coming

Soon the students of Year 10 and Year 11 and 12 VCE will sit their mid-year examinations. These will take place during June (Monday 3 June – Tuesday 11 June for VCE students, and Tuesday 11 June – Friday 14 June for the Year 10 students) and are vital in the learning journey of the boys.



The examinations are important for a number of reasons. Firstly, they test a student's learning, giving him a clear indication of what has been learned, of his strengths, and his areas for improvement. They also act as tool for learning, as when a student prepares for an examination through a thorough revision process, significant learning happens. Examinations provide a solid goal for achievement, particularly when, as is the case with many senior students, a clear

career goal is not always obvious to them. And, in reaching that goal, examinations provide an opportunity for a student to succeed, to show off what he has learned and to enjoy the satisfaction that comes from that.

More tangibly, the examinations are an essential hurdle in progression through the Senior School. For Year 10 and 11 students, the mid-year examinations contribute directly to the students' grades and reports. Most importantly, a student's examination grades are considered during the subject selection process for VCE 2020, assisting in discussions of whether a student's subject choices are appropriate.



For Year 12 students, the mid-year examinations, while not contributing directly to their Study Score or ATAR, are still integral to their VCE success. Firstly, they are a designated hurdle task to demonstrate satisfactory achievement in each of their subjects; the examination must be completed to a satisfactory standard in order to achieve the 'S' result for the Unit. More importantly, they provide the student and his teachers with a roadmap of the journey to the final examinations, the areas already consolidated and those needing attention clearly marked.

In the next edition of *Agite*, VCE Learning Leader, Miss Carmel Lardner, and Year 10 Learning Leader, Ms Ashleigh Fleming, will provide more details of the examinations including timetables and the VCAA and school rules governing examinations, but I wish to take this opportunity to discuss the attendance of examinations.

The examinations are a compulsory part of schooling, and students must attend the examination for each subject in which they are enrolled. The rules around the governing of examinations are based on the rules of the VCAA examinations and the SACs. There will be no rescheduling of examinations unless due to a clash with an accelerated study or due to an absence due to documented illness. On these occasions, the student will sit the examination at a date and time as directed by the Year Level Leader; the examination will be an alternate paper.

If a student is absent from the examinations without appropriate official documentation, the student will receive a 0 score but will be required to sit an alternate examination paper at an extraordinary examination session taking place outside of school hours, including a Saturday. This will allow him to satisfactorily complete his Semester 1 subject.

In addition to the mid-year examinations, all Year 12 VCE students, and any Year 11 VCE student undertaking a Unit 3 and 4 (Year 12) subject will also be sitting the General Achievement Test (GAT) on Wednesday 12 June. A three-hour examination that tests student skills in a range of areas including written communication, Mathematics, Science and



Technology, and Humanities and the Arts, the GAT, while not really possible to study for and not actually contributing directly to the ATAR, acts as a moderator and an insurance policy should something go wrong with a student's examination campaign in October/November.

The examinations, while a daunting prospect and a source of stress for many students, also represent an opportunity to test knowledge and skills, and open up new opportunities.

Bind us to all men and women of our time so that together we may bring the Good News to the ends of the earth.


Open our hearts and our Christian communities to the needy, the afflicted, the oppressed. May we radiate the Living Christ and transform our lives in the hope of the Resurrection.

A Day of Thinking... Year 12 Philosophy Excursion

As a part of the Year 12 RE - Philosophy Program, we are attended the Gifted and Talented Conference Day at Camberwell Grammar School. This is a day for bright, ambitious students who are interested in ideas.



This year, the focus will be on the capacity of students to more readily manipulate abstract ideas and make connections across school subject areas. There were five Sessions we attended:

- 1. The Psychology of Outstanding Achievement.
- 2. Knowing What You Know and What You Don't Know.
- 3. Politics of Tolerance and Freedom.
- 4. Philosophy, Love and Relationships.



Exploring Religions in Our Society - Year 11



It was interesting to learn about the different rituals and beliefs within themselves."

Student Safety - Crossing the Road

At the beginning of the school year, the Knox Council moved the school crossing on Brenock Park Drive to a new location. As a result, this new location is approximately 50 meters further away from Woolworths and the Burwood Highway than it used to be. Whilst the move has helped to ease some congestion around the main school entrance, as well as the entrance to Wally Tew Reserve, it has seen a small

number of students trying to cut across Brenock Park Drive in an unsafe manner. This sort of behaviour is extremely dangerous and places students in a very unsafe position – a position that could result in serious injury or even far more tragic results. We have also had reports of students cutting across Burwood Highway without using the traffic lights – arguably an even more dangerous risk given how busy that road can be during the day.

Students have been made aware of the clear expectations of the College; that they are only permitted to cross either road at the crossing, at a set of traffic lights or by using the tunnel that goes underneath Brenock Park Drive near the bike track/creek. Staff will be monitoring student use of the roads near school and will issue immediate Saturday Detentions for any student who fails to cross the road safely.

The response to this issue from the College is a strong one, but it is far too serious of a concern to be taken lightly. I encourage all parents to discuss these concerns with their son/s.

I trust we have parent support with this matter and thank the entire school community for their support. Hopefully we see all students use our roads safely in the future.

17 May, 2045

Dear Mum and Dad,

I know this message will take up to 24 minutes to get to you but here I am. I made it to Mars. It seems like only yesterday but it was ten months ago that I left Earth on this epic journey. And as our planets move away from each other, it will be another few years before I can return.

You will remember how I spoke of my time at Mission Control. There, I got to give the astronauts instructions. It sounds odd but with only short bursts of an hour or so on the surface, we need to make sure that the astronauts do exactly as

required. We gave them clear instructions, where to look, what to pick up, where to dig, what instrument to use when. Sometimes we had interference on our communication and we had to solve problems but we worked as a team and did it. We were worried about dust storms and solar flares and we had to find that perfect window of maximising our time on Mars without endangering the astronauts.

Yesterday I finally stepped on the surface. The rocks were firm but there was a layer of dust everywhere. The rovers had done some preparatory work for us but sometimes the samples they had drilled or the markers they had placed were buried. It was harder that I thought maneuvering myself with all that equipment. Things that seemed easy on Earth, were harder wearing thick gloves and carrying your life support. And the light on Mars is red and different, making visual cues less obvious.

Today, we have been in the lab working with our samples. We are looking for evidence of how the Martian surface was formed. There have been many varied factors affecting what we saw. Tectonic activity, marsquakes, erosion, meteor impact and even evidence that something has flowed through the valley.

I have to go now but I'll leave you with some quotes from my fellow astronauts.







"It was quite tough to move around, and it was really heavy, even just looking to your side was difficult."

Recognising Opportunity When It Presents Itself

For the most part, we, as individuals, pursue our own interests and feel more comfortable when in control of our own destiny. We work hard to keep moving, we may stumble and fall, but we strive to improve our situation as we move from experience to experience, learning from each along the way. And yet, sometimes in life we are not afforded the luxury of choice and personal autonomy over our

decisions. Therefore, the question often becomes about what do we do when an opportunity arises on its own. How will we react? What will we choose to do?

For our Year 9s, Term 2 has proved itself to be full of these almost accidental opportunities, a prime example being the NAPLAN tests our students participated in last week. For all the commentary around the necessity of the tests and the effectiveness in assessing student learning, what it provides is an incredible opportunity for students to try their hardest and do their best. The message from our staff to the student cohort was exactly that; no matter what it is, always do your best. Although we did not engineer this opportunity, nor did we choose to create it, we must recognise its merit, and utilise it for our benefit. As a result, we had our highest student participation rate for some time and all students who participated were engaged and brought a sense of challenge and learning opportunity into to each test.



Similarly, our My Town program, which is the focus of our integrated studies on Friday's in Term 2, has started in the way we expected; full of energy and enthusiasm. Once again, our message to the students has been to take this

opportunity with both hands and make it their own. The program gives our students the opportunity to travel into the suburbs, research important issues and concerns within the community, interview members of the public and present their findings as a group, in a news report. Before each group assumes the role of investigative journalists and presents their findings, they are required to travel to several inner suburbs to compare differences and similarities in the key areas of economics, social studies, geography, history and architecture. It is here we see students initially out of their comfort zones working collaboratively with different students to achieve a common goal. Once again, we, as a staff, reinforce this area of our program as an incredible opportunity for growth and to challenge oneself to try their hardest and be their best.





Ultimately, we may not always choose what experience comes our way, but it is up to us to make each one an opportunity for growth and improvement. As the NAPLAN experience has now ended for our cohort, and My Town program continues to build momentum, our eyes become firmly fixed towards the next challenge on our horizon; semester exams. The message remains the same; we may not choose or create our own challenges, but everything is an opportunity to learn and grow.

Study vs Homework

Examinations are approaching. Students should be organising their notes, creating cue cards, going over past assessments and setting up a consistent routine for homework and study for the fast-approaching Senior School examinations. The examination timetable will be released shortly to the boys so it is very important that your son takes note of when his examinations are for each subject. Some students may have examinations that will clash which means they will need to collect a clash form from my office to reschedule.



Over the last few weeks, students have been working on creating study routines tailored to their learning needs. They have been learning about different ways of revising to help them prepare for the upcoming exams. It is important for students to continue developing these academic skills as the year progresses.

When you have a discussion with your son about his learning, and ask whether he has any homework, the answer is all too often a no. It may be helpful to talk with your son about the distinction between homework and study. This has been a recent focus in Year Level Assemblies and should be a concept that is becoming familiar with your son:

Homework

- Set by subject teacher.
- Relevant to the current topic.
- · Part of the coursework demands.

Study

- Set by the students.
- Planned in weekly schedule.
- Specific to what the student needs to work on.
- · Includes revision.

Should your son feel the need to seek assistance in creating a good study routine, he is welcome to drop by the Year 10 office anytime. Together we can come up with a routine and strategies so that your son my get the best results on his upcoming exams.

Excursions

On Tuesday 14 May, Year 12 VCE students were involved in an incursion delivered by the organization, '*Elevate*', which focuses on the steps to take prior to SACs and exams. It was aimed at preparing them effectively for their examinations and to assist with development of skills to perform well under pressure





which is aptly timed with mid-year exams fast approaching.

The sessions were delivered by young, enthusiastic people who were not so long ago, in the same position as our boys themselves. It was an invaluable hour for the students as they were given tips on time management before a SAC or examination as well as timing within the examination itself.

They outlined the seven Steps for Exam Preparation Excellence:

- 1. Give yourself adequate time to prepare (at least three weeks before the assessment).
- 2. Go through past papers and correct mistakes (many of them the best form of preparation).
- 3. Get teachers' advice (create a checklist of things to improve).
- 4. Learn from the people around you (ask them how they get A grades!).
- 5. Fix mistakes (redo practice papers and get them remarked).
- 6. Use an Exam Preparation Planner (countdown to the exam).
- 7. Practice papers, practice papers, practice papers.

Year 12 subject teachers will be directing boys to the resources provided to assist with their upcoming exam. If students or parents wish to access additional resources or information it can be obtained through the Elevate website www.elevateeducation.com

The Year 12 Business Management cohort also had an excursion to the Yakult factory in Dandenong to closely examine its manufacturing operations. The students had the opportunity to see first-hand how quality and technology strategies can implemented effectively which will help them greatly in their upcoming assessments.

Both of these activities will be incredibly valuable for upcoming Unit 3 exams.

STEMming the Community – Science Professional Learning

Recently, some of our local feeder schools had the opportunity to participate in some Professional Learning run by our Science Department as part of our STEMming the Community initiative. In this after school session, we shared our expertise and experience of teaching science process skills. These skills are the ones scientists use in their day to day life, from questioning, predicting and planning, to conducting investigations and collecting data, to analysing and evaluating, and then drawing conclusions from this.

Science Process Skills - Through Investigation

We unpacked the ways in which an investigation could be conducted from Prep to Grade 6, using the example of 'which types of balls bounce the highest?'. Our primary teacher visitors conducted this investigation and had to design a way to collect and record data, before trying to draw conclusions from the data – it is harder than it sounds! Throughout this activity, teachers were then generating more questions that they would need to investigate or problem-solve, and thinking about how this would apply to their classrooms.

We finished the Professional Learning session with an array of science models and activities that teachers could apply in their classrooms, across all year levels, with examples for every type of

science covered by the Victorian Curriculum. A favourite was the homopolar motor, which can be simply assembled from a battery, a magnet and a piece of copper wire. We are already looking forward to sharing more of our resources with our local community and continuing to learn with them next time!

- Thursday 25 July Japanese Day and Italian Competition.


