

The Holiday Rs

Another set of holidays is coming.





Students work hard. They put in seven-hour days where they are being asked to concentrate, be creative, think critically and communicate at the highest level they can. Following this, they are then expected to put in additional hours of work every night and on the weekends. If they are doing everything they are expected to, students are working at least as hard as a lawyer during a case, an engineer during a major project or, indeed, a teacher on any given day during the term. And, as mentioned, their work is not passive work; it is active and concentrated intellectual work.

Of course our students deserve the holidays. Moreover, they need them.

But how to use them?

The holidays are an important time in a student's school year, and their importance can be summarised by a number of Rs. Not the traditional three Rs of reading, writing and arithmetic (and don't get me started on the fact that only one of those words start with R) but some Rs that apply to the whole student.

Students will be relieved to hear that one of the things they should do on the holidays is **relax**. The often frenetic pace of Term 2 and the demands upon student energy and time is such that they really do need to relax and, in relaxing, **recharge**. These are the first two of their holiday Rs.

Next, they should **reconnect**. The routine of school becomes such a rhythm that there is a real risk that students become so focussed on their schooling that they let their relationships with the most important people in their lives – their families – slide. The holidays present a time to reconnect with their families. With the demands of school on pause for these two weeks, students should endeavour to spend some quality time with their family.

The remaining holiday Rs relate to the students' studies. First they need to **reflect**. Students should consider how they have approached their studies and ask themselves some key questions, and then reassess that approach. What has worked well? What hasn't? What approaches to study need to change? Have they given the appropriate level of respect, time and attention to their studies? Have they cultivated strong learning relationships with their classmates and teachers?

Having done this, students should **review**. Look at the school work of the first two terms and consider them as part of the whole year's campaign, noting where the strengths are and also where there are gaps. Use this to create a bit of a plan for when they approach the next R – **revision**.

Students should use this time to revise, to go over the material and skills they have learned and to ensure they learned it well. They should take the time to revise and study, to go over their notes, enhance them or perhaps create new ones, and to complete tasks and exercises similar to those they have already done in class and for homework. This will ensure they are **ready** for when they **return** (there are another couple of Rs for them).

So, while they are enjoying their richly deserved holidays, students need to adapt the holiday Rs as they do so. They should to **relax** first of all, so that they **recharge** their spent **reserves**. While they're doing that, they need to **reconnect**



with their family **relationships**, spending **real** time with these important people. They should also consider their studies, and **Reflect** on their learning as they **review** and **revise** so that they are **ready** for when they **return** for the start of Term 3.

Lots of Rs there.

What is the Principle Purpose of Semester Reports?

The College Reports are a record of your son's academic and behavioral performance. The reports are designed to be objective and educative, revealing areas of strength as well as areas that require improvement. For educative purposes, they are not an end in themselves but a starting point for discussion and planning. To this end, Semester Reports inform discussion at the Parent Teacher Student Conferences. Semester Reports are but one form of evidence that can be used by the student (supported by parents and teachers) to inform on the progress of their learning and help establish achievable and challenging academic goals moving forward.

How Do We Use the Report for Discussion With Our Son?

The semester reports reveal your son's:

- Academic Outcomes for Semester One.
- Application of his Work Habits.
- · Proficiency in applying Key Subject Skills.

Year 10

Prepration, Execution, Reflection

The end of second term is always busy for Year 10, with end of Semester One classes leading into exams, then start of Semester Two and then Work Experience.

There is no set routine which is good at this time of year with the cold, some students on trade sites in the last week of term getting up much earlier than usual might disagree. Year 10 students should be commended for how they conducted themselves during the exam period. They took it very seriously. It will be good for students to reflect on how they went and what they learned about the experience and about themselves. We can always get better. This year at the end of Game 7 of the Eastern Conference Semi-Finals, Philadelphia's best player, Joel Embiid, was shown crying after the game. Some commentators reported on how much losing had affected him, other reporters pondered that if it meant so much to him perhaps, he would get in better shape so that he could stay on the floor longer and given his team a better chance to win. Like a sporting contest, there are three parts to the exam preparation, execution and reflection. At Year 10, they are all important. Unlike a sporting contest, you are only battling against yourself.

To help with preparation for 2020 next term, there is a lot of information presented that is of vital importance. During the second week back to school, Wednesday 24 July, there is the Career and Senior School Expo from 6-8.30pm with specific Year 11 2020 information in Chieri and a host of training and employment companies, universities, TAFEs and



others available to talk to in the Stadium.

The week after that, Wednesday 31 July, it is a student free day in order to run Year 10 into Year 11 subject consultation. Decisions need to be made that should come from well-thought-out conversations with parents, teachers and whoever else is needed to come to the right conclusion.

Last year this group of students were involved with the Year 9 into 10 course counselling day. Now the decisions have advanced in their importance. Students need to make the decisions that work for them. Asking questions, looking ahead to what they want to do in the future, seeking out other students who have been through subjects that they are looking at. Hopefully Work Experience will give its own information to students about what happens after school. Hopefully there are no bad experiences, but even they provide vital information.

There are plenty of avenues to research Universities, TAFEs and all sorts of other pathways. The Expo will be very helpful for that. Subject teachers of VCE are also excellent resources. What is covered in Business Management? How is Physical Education different to Sport and Recreation? What are the three Maths and what is the best to choose? Asking questions is the best way to go, like anything a good effort goes a long way. And the big question is how are students going to get where they want to go? The basics of being punctual, having a good work ethic and attitude, being coachable and good manners go a long way and are not a reflection on how well you can solve for x, or program a supercomputer, or fix a tap. In my experience, a good first and continuing impression can be made with how someone sends an email, as I write this a student in Year 11 who has this mastered comes to mind straight away, and this skill will help him immensely.

There is no perfect answer for what is the next step or the best subjects or VCAL vs VCE and this is how life works. It's exciting, scary, hard work, enjoyable and a whole host of other emotions. The school is there to help and make sense of the process so the best outcomes are achieved. Any question that is answered gets everyone that little bit closer.

English

Speed Dating in English Language

Addressing essay topics can always be a daunting and difficult task for many students. Knowing how to address topics and coming up with a well-structured and relevant essay plan can be the biggest challenge in the English classroom.



Led by our Year 12 English Language teacher, Ms Marian Spires, the boys took on a new approach to this challenge, focussing on collaboration, sharing and collective problem solving. As demonstrated in the pictures below, the boys set up the room with tables facing each other and created a 'speed dating environment.'

First, the boys were given four essay topics and completed a 'think, pair, share' task which got them thinking about the topics on their own before discussing their ideas with another student.

After this task, the speed dating began!

Each student went on four dates, each lasting no more than three minutes. During their 'date', the boys had to swap ideas and examples, highlighting their understanding of the topic and providing a possible response to it.

Following this, the students were asked to generate an essay plan based on one of the topics. Ms Spires commented that the boys were 'highly engaged' and this task aided in their preparation for an upcoming assessment task.

Science

Möbius Strips
