

Ticket to the Future

The theme of this year's Careers and Course Selection Expo is *Your Ticket to the Future*. This is an apt theme, as Term 3 is a time of decision making for Senior School students, where they explore the possible destinations of their future and start taking steps in securing their spot on that journey into the unknown. Everyone arrives at the future eventually, but not everyone has a say in just where they



land: the next few weeks are vital in assisting the boys of St Joseph's College in choosing the right landing spot in the landscape of their future.

This is a critical period of choice for the young men comprising the Senior School of St Joseph's College – the Year 10, 11 and 12 students – and those boys on the cusp of being part of the Senior School – the Valdocco boys. They are all about to make some decisions that will affect them for some time to come, exercising the power of choice to various degrees.

This week, all Senior School students will be participating in the St Joseph's College Careers and Course Selection Expo. Students and their families will be able to meet with representatives of the diverse subjects on offer at St Joseph's in 2020, as well as with exhibitors hailing from Universities, TAFEs, apprenticeship providers, industry groups and vocational organisations. This evening is integral to making sure the boys are booked on the right flight into their future, and that they have a window seat as well. The choices they make will be incredibly informed ones because of the opportunities presented by this evening.

As well as being able to meet with representatives of the major tertiary institutions and industry and vocational groups, Year 12 students and their parents will be provided with information about VTAC (Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre), the body that handles the applications to the vast majority of Victorian tertiary institutions, and post-school options at the Year 12 Information evening on that same evening.

Year 12 students will soon be making decisions about their future education and employment. Applications to VTAC will soon open, and most Year 12 students will be applying. In order to ensure that their decisions are informed decisions, the College is aiding the boys in a number of ways.

The next step for the Year 12 students is up to the students themselves – visiting the diverse range of Open Days being held by the Universities and TAFEs, where they will be able to discuss the courses that interest them in greater detail, as well as getting a feel for the campuses where they may be spending a significant part of their time over the next few years. The College will support the Year 12s with guidance in regards to career choices as they involve themselves in the VTAC application process. The Head of Pathways, Mrs Vivienne Egan, is currently having the first of at least two meetings with each of the Year 12 students, assisting them in their planning for 2020.

Year 10 and 11 students are also making decisions. Their attendance to the same Expo and the relevant Information Evenings on the same night is the first step in the process of building an itinerary for their future. In the following week, Year 11s will select their Year 12 programs in readiness for this vital year of study. Year 11 students have the opportunity to make an appointment with senior members of staff to assist them as they complete these applications.

Year 10 is the pathways year, where significant decisions in terms of pathways are made and these young men have a variety of choices to make, including VCE or VCAL and choice of subjects and disciplines. To assist with these monumental decisions, Year 10 students will also participate in the Careers and Senior Secondary Expo with their parents. They are able to discuss each of the VCE offerings and also to discuss future directions with the tertiary representatives. To support them in making these important choices, each Year 10 student will have a consultation appointment with a senior member of staff during a Year 10 student-free day on Wednesday, 31 July.



Then there are the Valdocco boys, making decisions related to the Senior School as they select their Year 10 programs. While the selections do not carry the same weight as those of the year levels above them, these are nonetheless important selections and the boys and their families are also being supported through an Information Evening on Wednesday 31 July and the provision of individual consultation appointments with a senior member of staff during a Valdocco student-free day on Wednesday, 7 August.

The future waits for these boys, and here at St Joseph's College we have their tickets ready. All they need to do is climb on board and see the journey through.

Back to Basics: Board Games in the Classroom

'If it ain't broke, don't fix it'

Often in education, we are looking to find the next 'big thing' or a new pedagogical trend to improve our teaching practice in the classroom. As educators, it is our moral duty to continually reflect on our practice and find new and improved ways to deliver content, manage the diverse needs in the classroom and teach our students the skills they need to thrive in the outside world.

But, sometimes a dive back to the basics can be just as effective.

In the last few days of Term 2, in an attempt to do something a little different and reward my wonderful Year 8s for their hard work, I decided to bring in a few board games: *Scrabble*, *Scattergories* and *Taboo*.

When the boys first saw me stumble through the classroom door, carrying a large pile of boxes, my heart sank as I listened to the myriad of comments thrown my way.

"What are those Miss?"

"I thought you said we were going to do something fun today?"

"Can't we just play games on our iPads?"

"Aren't board games just for old people?"

By far the most depressing comment was the following...

'Miss Young, what's a board game?'

This comment stopped me in my tracks; I couldn't believe that this student had *never* played a board game before! I have such fond memories of playing these games with friends growing up, reveling in the competitive nature of them, laughing at the ridiculous answers a peer or even myself would conjure up just to win another point, the feeling of accomplishment I gained whenever I was able to outsmart my opponents.

By now, I had succumbed to the idea that this class was doomed to fail. I thought to myself that I would give it ten minutes before changing tact. As I walked up to the front of the class, I was frantically thinking of a 'Plan B.'

Thankfully there was absolutely no need for one.

What transpired over the next 60 minutes was incredible. The boys broke off into groups, moved tables to suit the learning environment, chose the board game they wanted to play and then started to read the rules and play. I was shocked and better yet, started to see skill development right in front of my eyes. What I witnessed was this:

I saw leadership. In each group there was one student who took charge, read the instructions carefully and ensured their group members not only knew how to play but kept everyone on track.







I saw teamwork. Students worked together and helped one another succeed. Despite the competitive nature of the games (which they loved) students still helped and supported one another through the various games.

I saw engagement. In the 60 minutes that we played these games, not once did a student give me an excuse to go get their iPad or leave to get a drink.


I saw problem solving. In *Scrabble*, students battled with making words with their limited letters and debated over the spelling and existence of many words. In *Scattegories* many students grappled with "thinking of a vegetable that starts with the letter D," or, "a famous saying that begins with the letter B!"

I saw thinking skills in action. Those playing *Taboo* had to think of ways to get a word across to their partner without saying the 'taboo' words. Students had to be creative in conjuring up new ways to allow their partner to associate with the chosen word.

I saw students work with words and language. These games forced students to use their knowledge of the English Language. They required skills in spelling, understanding of word meanings and an ability to think of synonyms, connotations and improve their own vocabulary.

Overall it was fantastic to see the students working without a device, playing with words and language, and enjoying something that they at first saw as old and archaic. The lesson here was that sometimes an 'oldie but a goodie' can have a positive and influential effect on our students.

I walked out of the class with a smile on my face and decided to walk into another Year 8 English class with the same boxes.

On Thursday 20 June, our Year 10 and 11 Italian students participated in the annual Dante Poetry Competition held at Melbourne University. The boys made an incredible effort in memorising and reciting their poem with the correct intonation and expression. They should be all very proud of themselves. Bravissimi!

Assante Seguin participated in the Finals on Thursday 18th of July. Out of the 2,800 students from all Victoria who participated in June, only 280 were there for the Finals. Well done to Assante for being in the top 10% of Victoria! Unfortunately, we did not win a third, second or first place. However, we should congratulate Assante for his amazing achievements. Bravissimo!



I would like to especially thank Mr Dom Fera for accompanying us and supporting our young men with their Italian studies and Mr Andrew Cooper for driving us to the station on a very rainy morning.
