I Still Learn

When my old alma mater, Monash University, was founded in 1958, it broke away from tradition in the selection of its motto. Usually, institutions of learning choose a Latin motto to represent their philosophy, the ancient language giving them the gravity they believe they need.



Instead, Monash University's founders looked to Italian, choosing its motto from the letters of tortured Renaissance master, Michelangelo. *Ancora imparo* is Italian for *I still learn*, something that Michelangelo wrote in his letters more than once. How appropriate that someone like Michelangelo, a genius and a master in his field, still felt that he was always learning.

My mind went to this motto when I reflected on the run of professional learning that the St Joseph's College staff recently participated in. The St Joseph's College staff are not geniuses – well, not all of us – but we like to think that we are experts in our field of teaching boys, and yet here we were embracing professional learning. Like Michelangelo, we are still learning.

While professional learning at St Joseph's College is an ongoing process, the end of Term 2 and beginning of Term 3 was highlighted by a number of vital professional learning opportunities.

The first was Glen Pearsill, an experienced educator and researcher, who shared insights into student learning and behaviour. Glen spent the day with the staff and provided us with many valuable strategies. Below are some of the St Joseph's College staff's one-line reviews of Glen's professional learning session:

- "Glen was a fantastic presenter. I thought he had plenty to offer staff in terms of the ways in which we interact with students."
- "Glen provided practical strategies that were presented to assist with student management and behaviour."
- "Create opportunities for students to reflect on how well YOU (as the teacher) communicated an idea, rather than how well THEY understood."
- "One of the best PDs we've had."
- "I would like to put into practice as many of his ideas as I can."
- "Both engaging and practical"
- It was genius in its simplicity. It was so concise and well thought out that I will keep referring to what was covered over and over again.

Our next presenter visited on the first day of Term 3. Ian Lillico is a former teacher and principal who is now an international educational researcher. Ian focussed on the many social, psychological, environmental and physiological factors that influence boys' learning and behaviour and provided us with strategies to address these. Our staff reviewers said:

- "lan shared some insights into the medical research behind learning and behaviour issues, and he gave us strategies which took these into account when helping kids with their learning."
- "I found out really interesting information about students with behaviour issues, and the challenges posed by these conditions, as well as ways that I can support these students."
- "He provided insight into the physical health of young people and how environmental changes and adjustments can really support the learning of the student."
- "There are reasons students behave the way they do and there are ways to tackle those reasons. Reading fiction makes you a better, safer, more successful person."
- "Where possible we should also include a virtue when praising our boys."
- "Giving them structure, a voice, ownership of the space and showing your personality as you teach were some of the strategies Ian provided."
- "Raising their self-esteem so students don't need peer esteem was a revelation."



The very next day, we joined the staff of Mater Christi College for our Staff Formation day. A change of pace, this day focussed more on our spiritual and personal growth, rather than our professional growth, but many would find it was too hard to separate the two. Our presenter was Carmody Grey, a theologian from the UK who presented an intelligent, engaging, challenging and ultimately uplifting program that many felt would end up helping our students as much as it ended up helping us. The staff said:

- "I really enjoyed having the opportunity to think about the ways in which we measure success and what really drives us."
- "I was struck by the simplicity of the message that the thing we put at the "centre of our universe" can be our life or destruction."
- "Very thoughtful PD session."
- "Comparison is the thief of joy' as a quote to remember why social media can be so damaging to young people really resounded with me."
- "Dr Grey made the Catholic faith highly accessible and tangible."
- "We are so obsessed with measuring that we forget to experience."
- "Dr Grey challenged us to consider how we use technology in learning, where it assists and where it impedes."
- "I like how Carmody defined Mercy: it is standing alongside someone who is hurting."
- "Carmody Grey was able to stretch our personal and collective thinking."
- "She forced us to think about the everyday was rejuvenating and an energising way to lead into the term."
- "I really appreciated the level of intellectual engagement that Dr Grey brought."
- "I liked the discussion around mercy and hope in particular."
- "This made a big impression on me."
- "Seeing God in others will help us be more merciful."

Finally, the professional learning season was also enhanced by members of the St Joseph's College staff themselves leading professional learning. Learning Area Leader for English, Ms Melissa Young has been leading staff through a structured approach to embedding literacy in all classes and has taken us through a series of engaging workshops. The staff say:

- "Melissa's presentations have been thought-provoking and engaging."
- "These sessions really emphasised the empowerment that comes with literacy."
- "This has already changed the way I have taught in the classroom and how I have structured questions."
- "The responsibility for improving literacy falls across all learning areas."
- "Literacy is the lifeblood of learning."
- "Melissa is providing practical ways for staff to access literacy across their classes."
- "These workshops have led me to introduce more tasks that involve extended reading into my Year 8 and 10 Science."
- "This program has been extremely beneficial for me and has allowed me to reflect on my teaching practices."

A group of teachers made up of the Director of Students, Mr Liam O'Keefe, Year 8 Leader, Ms Jacqui Cooke, and Year 7 Leader, Mr Brian Martin, also provided a workshop on boys' education to our staff. The workshop was very well received, teachers saying:

- "It is great to hear what other staff members have to offer, particularly as they know our boys so well."
- "I found the speakers and the quality of their presentation excellent."
- "I learnt how to be a more inspirational educator and communicator to students."
- "I found new resources to assist the boys with developing a positive mindset, as they learn to value themselves and their own positive traits."
- "An excellent session. I've instituted "brain breaks" in my lessons."
- "I liked the practical elements of this session. I am aiming to add more Brain Breaks and Positive Primers into the classroom."
- "The focus on gratitude and well-being in the classroom is something I will aim to be more aware of."



We are sure that the students will notice some changes to their classes, all of them positive, and all of them as a result of the fact that their teachers – like Michelangelo, like the boys themselves, like all of us – are still learning. *Ancora Imparo*.

Year 7

A Very Ferny Creek

This term at Year 7, the boys will be heading out to Ferny Creek across the road from the school. The close excursion will really help shape the boys' understandings of ecosystems and in particular, their understanding of how human involvement can change an ecosystem. With the creek running alongside Woolworths and the bike track, the boys will view the changes in environment





caused by humans to help us live and will also need to think about the changes they would make themselves to improve the ecosystem of Ferny Creek. Your son should be able to tell you about the food chains and food webs in the environment when he gets home and you can also ask him about the abiotic and biotic factors.

In Math, we have started our Algebra unit where the boys learn the basic rules so you could ask your son about like terms and how to find equivalent expressions. Livability has been the topic for Humanities as well, so you could begin by asking your son what factors influence a place's livability and how that can change depending on your age and interests. The boys are also well and truly into their Trash work for English. We always argue in the office about whether it was fair for the boys to keep some of the money for themselves or not in the book so maybe that's a discussion you could have with your son.

In other news, the boys have also started their Term 3 ACC Sports of Basketball, Table Tennis and Hockey. The boys have all been keen to start and even the boys back at school are excited to go to Ten Pin Bowling, the Gym or do sports out on the oval.

Year 8 Retreat

In Week 2, our Year 8s travelled to Lysterfield for their Year 8 Retreat. The focus of the retreat was masculinity and helping boys understand what it means to be a man. We were very lucky for the boys to work with Indi Hangan, a carpentry business owner, with over 40 employees. He spoke to the boys about skills employers look for, who are

good mentors and what qualities we should learn from. He had the boys reflect about how your behaviour teaches others what is appropriate and acceptable. The boys reflected on how you back up the right behaviour and condone the wrong behaviour.

A key focus of the day was taking responsibility for your actions, taking positive leadership and showing care. Indi had the boys thinking about friends' behaviour and the role we have in correcting that behavior. The session covered emotions and vulnerability and how important these are in being a responsible and reliable adult.

At the end of the day, the boys put together care packages for women and children in domestic violence refuges. This was a wonderful opportunity for the boys to think about others and take a small step to consider the impact of poor choices.

Many of the boys purchased and collected products to put in the care packages. It's worth considering next time you stay at a hotel and you don't use that conditioner or make up wipe. We can use it next year. Some of the hotels even commented positively on us doing this.

MyCity Update



For integrated studies this term, the Year 9 cohort are participating in a range of learning experiences in Melbourne's CBD. On the first Friday of the term all of the boys took part in an "Amazing Race" that saw them follow clues and directions that helped them make their way along a course that wove its way around the streets of the CBD in order to answer questions

and complete a number of tasks. The purpose of this exercise was to acquaint the boys to the layout of the CBD, to provide them opportunity to interpret instructions and use a map.







For the first two Fridays of this unit, we met at school and all walked to the train station together for our ride to the CBD. But as of Week 3, students have the opportunity to travel to the CBD independently with their class mates and meet their teachers at predetermined meeting places around the CBD.

On the second Friday of this term, we commenced the rotation part of this program that saw different classes undertaking visits to a variety of significant places in the CBD to engage in learning activities. These places included the Shrine, the MCG, Melbourne Docklands and Ian Potter Gallery of the NGV.

Year 10

Year 10 News

Year 10 students have started Term 3 exceptionally well, after coming back refreshed from their Winter Holidays. Term 3 holds many exciting opportunities such as subject consultations and the muchanticipated Alpine Experience in Week 5.

This term Mr Tom Fay and myself will begin reviewing student data from Semester One. The review of this data will result in the development of academic strategies to be implemented in order to help students improve their learning outcomes for this Semester and the years following.

One of the strategies suggested will be the use of the afterschool study program 'ARVO Study' which will be now



running Wednesday for Mathematics and Thursday for English afternoon in Room 47 and 12. Late last term, the Year 10 boys completed a survey which asked them to identify how they would like this program to operate. A mixture of scheduled afterschool classes will also continue to be run prior to SACs and a quiet space to complete homework will also continue to be given to students.

The boys are encouraged to take up these opportunities as they present themselves this term and make the most out of their final semester in Year 10.

Good old question 17

In this class we test ideas by using "what if" questions or by asking 'further questions' to help us work out a problem.

Preparation, execution and reflection. It is so easy to write, but difficult to put into proper practice. Execution must happen or there is nothing. Whether a driving test, Maths exam, Chemistry prac, self-portrait, the execution is key. If it is good, then the preparation must have been good, at least that is the assumption. There are always concerns with reflection though, outside of "I'm glad that's over".

Students are surveyed yearly for all of their classes. Broadly, students are asked about teacher attitudes, techniques and practices. Question 17 is brought up as a stumbling block. It has been surmised that teachers should use "What if" vocally more often in classes to meet the requirements of this question.

Reflecting on the idea of further questions made me think of a past student who graduated last year. Whenever he asked for help with Maths, if I ever made a comment related to the work he would explore it. If a question looked complicated but then worked out a bit too neatly and I said that, like a complicated solving algebra problem where everything cancelled out nicely to leave an answer of 4, he would ask me for a similar question that didn't have as neat a solution. If the book or the student had a certain way of working out a question and I said that I'd show him that way but that's not the way I would do it, he would insist that I show him the other way as well. It was a fantastic attitude to have. Sometimes too much information can confuse students so for more complicated work I might preface it with "this won't be covered on the test or the exam" and he always rejected that, he was just searching to be better, trying to answer what if the question was more difficult, what if there was another technique. It was an impressive attitude.

So therein lies the challenge for students. Teachers eyes light up when there is the want to learn more, do more. There are not many better moments in teaching than when a question comes from a student who has reflected on the work, and challenges the content covered, but then this can be incorporated into the lesson and it is like a light bulb has gone off with that student and others.

Reflection is difficult. We make mistakes, we don't work as hard as we should, it can be deflating and negative. But, and this is the most powerful statement, if you realise you are not there "yet" then you control the process. It's all part of getting better and improving. Perfect gets in the way of progress.

Preparing for 2020

Students completing Unit 3 & 4 VCE subjects received a brochure entitled VCE Exams Navigator 2019 — which can also be located at https://www.vcaa.vic.edu.au/Documents/vcaanavigator_web.pdf. All VCE students should be familiar with this information as exams are an integral part of the assessment over the two year program.



This document includes a copy of the 2019 external exam timetable which begins with Language exams followed by the all important English exam on 30 October, only four months away. It also outlines all basic stationery required for exams



as well as subject specific materials that are permitted in the exam room. Most importantly, it contains the VCAA rules for the conduct of VCE external assessments, some of which are highlighted below:

- 1. Students must not cheat or assist other students to cheat including taking any action that gives or attempts to give them or another student an unfair advantage in a VCE external assessment.
- 2. Students must not allow, induce or assist any other person to present for a VCE external assessment in their place.
- 3. Students must not present for a VCE external assessment in another student's place.
- 4. Students must not present for a VCE external assessment under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- 5. Students must obey and observe all proper instructions or directions given by their supervisor.
- 6. Students must provide reasonable assistance to any investigation by VCAA in relation to a suspected breach of the VCAA rules.
- 7. Students attending a VCE external assessment may bring only materials and equipment approved for that external assessment into the examination room.
- 8. Students must not possess mobile phones and electronic devices that are capable of storing, receiving or transmitting information or electronic signals, such as recorded music and video players, organisers, dictionaries and computerised watches, during a VCE external assessment.
- 9. Students detected with any device defined in Rule 8 must, upon the direction of a supervisor, surrender that device for inspection. Any confiscated device may be retained, pending any investigation into an alleged breach of VCAA rules. Students must provide reasonable assistance to VCAA or its agents to enable the interrogation of the device.
- 10. Students must not bring into or possess in the examination room any drinks or food except under special circumstances as approved and directed by the VCAA. Bottled water is permitted in the examination room under approved conditions.
- 11. Students must not communicate with any other student while the VCE external assessment is being conducted.
- 12. Students must not cause any nuisance, annoyance or interference to any other student during a VCE external assessment.
- 13. Students must not remove or tear out any part of a bound reference, question/task book, question and answer book or answer book, except where permitted, for example formula sheets.
- 14. Students must not remove any response material, used or unused, from the examination room.
- 15. Students must not begin to write or mark their paper or response material in any way, or use a calculator, until advised by a supervisor that writing may commence.

At the Careers Expo in Week 2, VCE students were directed to begin searching the online VTAC Guide. The guide lists all available courses for 2020 and provides students and their families with an opportunity to decide on future pathways after life at St Josephs College. The process of course selection is yet another indicator that the journey for our Year 12 boys is quickly coming to an end with Term 3 being their final full term at the College. It also indicates that Year 11 students are soon to begin their final year of secondary education. At this stage of the year, I encourage families to sit down together to discuss possible options for the future.

As many University and TAFE providers indicate, one in five students drop out of courses within their first year. It is my strong belief that students should consider the following 3 aspects in order to avoid becoming a part of this statistic.

- 1. Choose courses which you think you will enjoy play to your strengths.
- 2. Choose courses that you believe you can do and will be good at.
- 3. Choose courses for YOU rather than courses others believe you should do.


Science


