What happens if students are missing from an examination?

Where the student has a medical certificate or other appropriate official documentation (funeral notice, police report etc. - a Learner's Permit or Driver's Licence appointment is not appropriate) to explain his absence

- Student presents the medical certificate or equivalent to the subject teacher.
- The teacher attaches a copy of the medical certificate or equivalent to the alternate exam paper and provides this to the Level Leader, together with instructions and any other ancillary materials.
- Student sits the examination during one of the clash blocks designated on the examination timetable.
- Where the student has no appropriate official documentation:
 - The teacher provides an alternate exam paper to the Level Leader, together with instructions and any other ancillary materials
 - Student sits the examination during the next Saturday Detention session.

Please note the following:

Full School Uniform should be worn to all examinations.

- Students should arrive at least 10 minutes before the examination starting time, which is indicated below.
- Examinations will follow all rules and guidelines as per the VCAA VCE Exams Navigator document.

It is now up to students to make the rest of their Year 12 as successful as possible so that when they do reach the actual end of their campaign, they can look back on this time with satisfaction rather than regret.

Without access to this medical outpost, the closest medical aid is one days walk away. I was fortunate enough to visit Sanjiwani in 2012 after the Tenzing-Hilary marathon. It was a heart-warming and humbling experience with memories that I treasure to this day.

Antarctica is fast-approaching and **Run for Sanjiwani** is under-way with a goal of raising \$20,000. Incredibly, this amount will cover the costs to run Sanjiwani for one year!"

Road Safety

As most parents and students would be aware, the College had some significant changes made to the location of the student crossing on Brenock Park Drive before the commencement of the 2019 school year. Whilst a number of months have passed by since the local council made these changes, there are still reports surfacing of some students making the decision to cross Brenock Park Drive, and nearing

roads including Burwood Highway, in an unsafe manner. These reports have come from staff who are stationed at bus stops in the afternoon and also from concerned members of the local community, including some parents, who have witnessed dangerous behaviour from students when conducting school pick-ups and drop offs.

I recently wrote to the entire school population reminding all of our students of their responsibilities to ensure that they are crossing nearby roads safely. These expectations have been clearly outlined and underline the importance of using the school crossing or traffic lights when crossing roads, at any time of day, before or after school.

As it is such a serious concern, with the potential for tragic outcomes, students who have been caught crossing roads in an unsafe manner have been issued with Saturday detentions recently. This process will continue for the rest of the school year and beyond.

I ask that parents please take the time to have a conversation with their son/s about the importance of being safe when crossing the road to help ensure that we can avoid any potential accidents from occurring.

At Valdocco there is always an array of varied learning activities to stimulate student engagement and foster new skills, as well as programs that are designed to promote student well being. Today I am highlighting a few of them.

Smart Generation

"Smart Generation is a program that aims to assist our students with rethinking their approach to alcohol. This past Thursday saw our 14 SRC's running their own engaging and informative sessions that covered aspects of alcohol culture such as physical and neurological ramifications of underage alcohol consumption, recognising and resisting peer pressures, confronting the ideas surrounding 'why' they think some people under the age of 18 drink, and acknowledging the harsh statistics that represent how often and how many young people are seriously affected by alcohol consumption. All seven sessions ran concurrently within each homeroom. I was fortunate enough to be able to witness each class in action. The efforts conducted by the SRCs in both the creation and implementation of this session are commendable. The engagement that I saw across the year level

makes me extremely hopeful that this program is succeeding in what it was designed to do; get the message out there


that alcohol consumption must be delayed until the legal age."

My City Update

Over the past weeks, Year 9 students have continued to enthusiastically work their way through the progam of learning experiences and tours that make up the My City unit of Integrated Studies. They have now started working on creating their own blogs and specialty tours on aspects of Melbourne's CBD that interest them. As part of this learning process, they have been introduced to an iPad application called Weebley Education that provides them with a platform to create their own website (not accessible by members of the general public). The students will present their blogs and specialty tours on this iPad application. Teachers have commented about the high level of engagement and excitement that has become

apparent as the boys begin this process and we are looking forward to viewing the resultant websites. Parents and other family members have been invited to attend the My City excursion on Friday 20 September to participate on their sons' tours and we are looking forward to seeing many parents











on this day. As in previous years, we trust that this will be a very rewarding experience for students, parents and other family members that attend.

Physical Science has been a Blast Lately

This term in the Physical Science challenge class, the boys have been building and testing water rockets as part of their study. I had opportunity to view some of their testing recently as rockets were launched across the college's football oval.

Here's what the teacher and students have to say about this course.

"The purpose of this challenge subject is to serve as an introduction to the physical sciences for students who have a keen interest in and/or aptitude for science. The course is designed to be as hands-on as possible with boys engaged in "making and doing" for large parts of lessons.

This first half of the course allows students to study Forces, Newton's Laws of Motion and Aerodynamics through the vehicle of a self-built bottle rocket. Custom made launchers are then used to propel their rockets to distances of up to 100 metres! Data collected from launching their rockets will lead to the boys completing an investigation and full scientific report relating factors such as water pressure and launch angle to the flight distance.

The second half of the course begins with a review of basic chemistry idea and leads into a practical and study of a variety of types of chemical reaction. Boys complete investigations and test theories via hands-on work in the laboratory. During this process they learn appropriate and safe techniques for such work and how to reliably analyse their results."

"In Year 9, we have been studying Newtown's Laws, so to put into practice what we have learnt, we were given a chance to make bottle rockets. These rockets were made out of old soft drink bottles which we modified with fins and a more aerodynamic body. To launch them we poured 200ml of water into the bottom of the rocket then connected it to a purpose built pump launch pad. We could change the PSI

(Pounds per Square Inch) to see how it changed the rocket's flight. Many of our rockets were able to handle up to 80 PSI before launching themselves up to eighty metres."

"In Physical Sciences class this term, we designed and built our own rockets out of soft drink bottles. We spent at least two weeks designing and building them before we set them up for lift off. The results of our launches were very surprising given we were just using water and compressed air. You could say that the bottles were very trustworthy and we did not come across any problems. This experiment was successful because we learned how flying rockets work with water and air."



Making Space and Time for Reading

"Think before you speak. Read before you think." Fran Lebowitz



Now for the practical challenges. Those who sing the praises of reading on a young mind, are more often than not, those who feel somewhat defeated by the idea of making space and time for reading in the classroom, or on a broader curriculum scale. The common challenges tediously emerge around timetabling, responsibility, accountability and choice, when the broader questions should be around how to best implement an effective reading program(s) and the intended purpose. With this in mind, we as a campus have implemented a whole campus reading program this year to communicate the importance of reading for our students, whilst aiming to create a culture around sharing ideas and valuing reflection in our learning schedule.

Creating space for reading is vital. In this case, space refers to the physical areas where students can easily read in peace and quiet, can search for available and accessible reading material, and feel free to discuss their reading adventures. The physical aspect of reading is often overlooked, but is undeniably linked to the act itself. Just as a favourite holiday is linked to a particular destination, or an office space can be equated with productivity, the physical environment to the reader is just as important. Creating spaces for students to search and share what their reading is equally as important in building a culture of hungry little book worms. Something as simple as a reading corner or a reading circle in the sunshine can transport a younger reader from the daily grind of their reality onto the magical pages of their favorite novel.

Running parallel to finding the right physical environment is finding the right time to read. Research shows that 15-20 minutes of reading before bed significantly increases the chances of quality sleep and can lead to more vivid dreaming. Whilst this is not the intended effect of our program, the importance of finding the right time for reading is crucial and the principle is similar. After trialling different allocations and periods of reading time, both our staff and students felt that 30 minutes, on the same day each week was the best approach to getting the most out of our reading without compromising other subjects and programs. Further to this, our focus has been on students choosing their own reading material with a preference of fictional texts, and each individual keeping a log of what they have read during each session.

When it comes to teaching and learning programs, there is never one model that fits all, and creating a reading program is no different. The fun is in finding out what works for your context and trying as many different approaches until something sticks. Our team is committed to continually finding ways to imbed reading into our program and share its enormous benefits with our enthusiastic and energetic students. The key is finding the right space and time.

With that in mind, Mr Dylan Price presented to the students about applications for the 2020 Kiribati Immersion. There is a long tradition of connection between St Joseph's College and Kiribati and so very different to almost anyone else's experience. Mr Price explained that when there is a tally of visitors to other countries for the year, Kiribati ranked third last.

On reflection, these term holidays may be the last one for many students in the classic two weeks off format. Next year many students will be undertaking a Year 12 subject and this will take up a lot of their time, along with a practice exam during the holidays. For others in VCAL and the like, there will likely be paid work that is done during this time. For some that is already the reality. ACC Term 3 Grand Final Results

Congratulations to our Senior B and Year 7B Basketball Teams, claiming Premierships in their respective Term 3 ACC Competitions.



The Senior B Team went into its Grand Final full of confidence after a comprehensive 19-point victory over St Bede's College in the Semi Final. They carried this strong form into the Grand Final, leading from start to finish to comfortably defeat Parade College 62-51, to claim our first Senior ACC Premiership.

The Year 7B Grand Final against Whitefriars College would prove to be a much closer contest, as only two points separated the teams when they played earlier in the term during the regular season. It was another very competitive matchup, with our boys taking the win by three points to secure the Premiership.

Our Senior A Basketball Team advanced through to the Grand Final undefeated with six wins from its six games, which included a 10-point win over Mazenod College in the Semi Final. The much-anticipated Grand Final matchup against Whitefriars would not disappoint, showcasing an exceptional standard of school basketball in a game with numerous lead changes. Unfortunately for our boys, it was Whitefriars that claimed the victory by three points, 63-60.



The Year 10B Team won through to the Grand Final following a 2-point Semi Final victory over Whitefriars College, to set up a matchup against Parade College. Despite defeating their Grand Final opponents in Round 1 earlier in the term, the boys knew it would be a much closer contest this time around, given their dominant display over St Bede's in the other Semi Final. Unfortunately, the Parade team was able to maintain its good form to take the victory.





They're Calling on You

Our Environmental Captain has a message to share with the community of St Joseph's that he presented to staff in briefing today:

"As some of you may have seen, there's a display currently in Chieri (organised by myself, Mr Harvey, Ms McDougal and Ms Wilson) inspired by the 'They're Calling on You' Campaign that Zoos Victoria is running.

This campaign aims to try and protect Eastern Lowland Gorillas from extinction. Their goal is for communities in Australia to recycle old mobile phones to reduce the impact of illegal mining of minerals such as coltan in Africa. So far they have received 171,000 devices donated by individuals, schools and workplaces.

So, we would as well like to create a contribution. A box for old mobile phone collection is set up in Chieri with the display, where it is easily accessible by both staff and students for donation. Hopefully, once we get a few people donating, more will follow. If it deems successful, I hope to having it running next year.

As far as collection, a free courier pick-up can easily be arranged from the Zoos Victoria website (which they can collect from anywhere in Australia). Money raised from donated phones will support Gorilla Doctors, an organisation working to





protect Eastern Lowland and Mountain Gorillas in the wild through veterinary and preventative care.

Barista Course

As part of the Certificate II VET Course in Applied Languages (Italian), this year our Year 9 boys have also undertaken a Barista Course with me.

Did you know that at Valdocco we have a real coffee machine?

To complete this course, our boys are learning:

- Where coffee comes from and how it is produced
- The terminology in Italian and in English related to coffee and espresso machine equipment
- · Safety and hygiene techniques around the espresso machine
- How to use and clean an espresso machine
- How to grind the coffee beans and adjust the grinder
- How to texturise the milk
- How to recognise and make different types of coffee (e.g. espresso, latte, cappuccino, affogato, macchiato etc)
- How to offer and order coffee in Italian

All our 20 Year 9 students can be proud to show off their current barista skills. Bravi!

To improve their knowledge and abilities about coffee making, our students took part in a workshop with Mr Hanna Haddad on Monday 16September. Mr Haddad is a former St Joseph's student and owner of a few local cafes. Mr Haddad graciously shared his expertise and 'barista secrets' with our boys, especially in regards of grinding the coffee beans and frothing the milk with a steam wand and have great results. Many of our young men challenged themselves and managed to make amazing cappuccinos that some lucky ones could taste. *Buonissimi*!

We would like to congratulate our students for "putting into practice what they have

learnt" this year in Italian, and we would like to thank Mr Haddad for helping our boys succeed as future baristas.
