



On our first day of competition our Senior and Junior team finished top of their tables and qualified for the State Finals. Importance of Gratitude

Many times the importance of gratitude has been impressed upon people at this school. The Resilience Project and other Resilience surveys and the like make an impact when they are focused on but it is so important to stay on top of that.





When the Resilience Project presented to the school in 2016 it was a very powerful event. They also visited St Joseph's in Boronia in 2017 which I also attended and that is the message of this article. It is easy to fall into the trap of "woe is me" but gratitude is something that helps to get us out of that situation and most of us need constant reminders of how grateful we should be for the good people we are surrounded by, the good opportunities that are made available to us, and all in all just a good situation we find ourselves in to live and to grow.

There are seven scientifically proven benefits of gratitude.

- Gratitude opens the door to more relationships.
- Gratitude improves physical health.
- Gratitude improves psychological health.
- Gratitude enhances empathy and reduces aggression.



- Grateful people sleep better.
- Gratitude improves self-esteem.
- Gratitude increases mental strength.

All of us would benefit from all of this. Reading one of the twenty-one day gratitude journals that are around there are also different activities that are encouraged. The main focus is seeing the world and yourself as positives. There are also actions like calling people you haven't talked to for a while which can make a much bigger impression on someone than we realise. There are big events in Term 4 including exams, reports and finishing school. Being grateful for what you have makes everything better.

Study, Exams, Head Start

For Year 10, we have an exciting Term ahead with examinations starting in Week 7 and in Week 6 for those studying a VCE subject. It is integral that the boys start developing positive study habits early in order to achieve success in their second set of Senior School examinations.

One of the study resources that the boys are encouraged to use is the ARVO Study Program (Afternoon Re-Vision and Organisation). This is a program that you can encourage your sons to attend if you feel that they need a little extra help. This takes place Thursdays after school in Room 12 (3:20pm-4:00pm). Both myself and other Year 10 staff members are there to offer help with English, Mathematics, Religious Education, Science and basic study skills.

The skills and content taught by the teachers this term will be imperative to your son's success in the upcoming exams. Teachers will emphasis on organisational skills, developing positive work habits and creating a positive learning environment throughout the next few weeks.







































English

What's on in Term 4?

As we enter the final quarter of the year, it is opportune to reflect on how far our boys have come.



After three terms in the English classroom our students will have not only consolidated but developed many new skills.

In terms of the Victorian Curriculum, our students have moved up another level, but as we know, what they have gained throughout the year is far more exciting and important than that.

Our boys have become better readers, better writers, better thinkers and better communicators. Term four sees our boys preparing for whatever 2020 has in store for them:

For Years 7 to 9, it will be preparing our boys for their next year of schooling. Ensuring they are armed with the ability to be active learners as they begin new courses and tackle new ideas and texts.

For our Year 10s they will be preparing to start their VCE or VCAL journey, or to be suitably equipped to enter the workforce.

For our Year 11s, the boys need to have the necessary skills to survive and thrive in a Year 12 English classroom, where the expectation is high and the competition is fierce.

And finally, our Year 12s are furiously preparing for a three-hour English exam that will influence their study score, ATAR and pathway for 2020, whatever that may be.

But our boys are not quite at their end of this year's journey yet. They still have much more writing, developing of ideas, preparing for assessments and reading ahead of them, as they continue their passage through their last term of the year.

Below is a list of the topics covered at each Year level in English classes:

Year 7: Informative writing and debating.

Year 8: Film as text- students will learn how to analyse film and understanding the different film techniques using *Edward Scissorhands* as the text platform.

Year 9: Using the texts studied throughout the year, students will look at the unifying themes, issues and ideas and write comparative responses in response to essay topics.


Year 10: Setting up the foundation for the VCE course, students will learn how written and visual language, as well as arguments and argument strategy can impact a particular audience.

Year 11: Unit 2 Outcome 2: Analysing Argument. Students will analyse persuasive texts and analyse how argument, written and visual language are used to influence an audience.


Year 12: Preparation and revision for the upcoming exams. As well as attend classes, students will meet regularly with their teacher to continue to develop their essay writing skills.

A New Pathway to Paramedicine

Due to the popularity of VU's paramedicine courses, a *new* pathway has been created to ensure that students have the best chance of reaching their career goals.

Students can now progress through the following steps to reach a bachelor degree:

Successfully complete <u>Certificate III in Non-Emergency Patient Transport</u> at our St Albans and Werribee campuses. Applications for this course are open now for a February 2020 start. Admission criteria are a current and valid driver's license (min. probationary) and a literacy and numeracy test.

Apply for <u>Diploma of Paramedical Sciences</u> for 2020 mid-year intake. With credit obtained from the Certificate III, students will be able to complete the Diploma in 6 months.

Pathway from the Diploma into second year of <u>Bachelor of Paramedicine</u> at the start of 2021.


