Late last term, our main student leaders for 2020 were elected to their positions after an exhaustive process. Max Brasher and Corey Preston were appointed College co-captains, while Thomas Keene was appointed SRC President. One could be forgiven for thinking that their roles would not commence until January 2020, but their official duties started almost immediately and continue to do so long after their 2019 school days have come to an end.



They have been involved in weekly assemblies almost from the start, and have had prominent roles in the Year 12 2019 Graduation Mass and Ceremony, the Remembrance Day commemoration and the Valdocco Return to Campus. In each event, they acquitted themselves well.

It is always fascinating to watch the leaders develop in capacity, confidence and presence over the twelve months of their leadership. From the early days of their appointment, where there can be a hesitation and rawness born of becoming accustomed to the new, to the smooth ease of leaders comfortable in their role by the end.

I have been privileged to witness their development as leaders up close in situations that many would find daunting.

Last week Principal Cathy Livingston and I accompanied the boys to Bosco College in Engadine, Sydney. The boys gave up part of their weekend and two days of their HeadStart 2020 Year 12 classes to represent St Joseph's at the annual Salesian Captains' Conference. This is an annual gathering of the captains of Salesian colleges from around Australia. Hosted this year in Sydney, the boys had the opportunity to meet with Captains and staff from every Australian Salesian school and participate in a number of leadership, faith and social activities with them. As they immersed themselves in this opportunity, what became apparent to the boys was a sense that they were part of a bigger community than they first thought. Finding other students who spoke as easily as they did of names such as 'Bosco' and 'Savio', meeting Salesian priests who had had their own experiences at St Joseph's College and asked the boys after teachers who were familiar to them, and seeing a heritage and tradition that mirrored their own (albeit with some weird spins like a *green* Savio House), impressed upon our students that they were part of something significant.

In the last event of the Conference, the boys were invited to speak about their College to 850 gathered students from Bosco College, Engadine. The pride in their school, their love for its traditions and their sense of belonging was sharply evident in all that Max, Corey and Tom had to say to that assembly.





They left Sydney behind, but not their duties. The very next day, they had prominent roles to play at the Valdocco Return to Campus Ceremony. While waiting for flight at Sydney Airport, the Captains asked if we would be singing the College Song at the Valdocco Assembly, and whether they would finally have their chance to state to the school community: I return a man. Alas, the song does not feature in the Valdocco event, and I noted Corey and Max deflate a little when I advised them of this. They brightened however, when told that the Song and its memorable line would feature at the Thanksgiving Mass and Awards Ceremony taking place on Friday 7 December.

The Valdocco Return to Campus Ceremony completed, we all prepared for something perhaps even more daunting than the Salesian Captains' Conference: the ACC Leadership Launch.

Entering a room filled with captains from other Salesian schools was daunting, but at least there was the sense that everyone was on the same side. The ACC Leadership Launch had the potential to be something different. Here was a room full of our competitors, our rivals on the sporting, arts and other arenas: the Captains of every school in the Associated Catholic Colleges competition. There was no need to worry.

Held at De La Salle College this year, the ACC Leadership Launch was filled with warmth and energy. The student leaders from the twelve ACC colleges spent the evening meeting one another over dinner and hearing about each other's schools. Once again, we were asked to speak about our school. This time, Max took the lectern alone. He spoke with feeling about St Joseph's College, giving the gathered a snapshot of our school and its opportunities, but also about the level of care he felt as a student there.

Chip away at the imperfections to reveal the art that lies within.

I recently had the pleasure of visiting the 'Galleria dell' Accademia' (Florence) to visit the statue of David. It is a breath-taking experience to see this massive 17 feet tall, 12,000 pounds sculpture that was created by the 26-year-old Michelangelo in 1501 from a single piece of marble.



Many consider this piece of sculpture to be the best of its kind. Sixteenth century Italian painter and architect Giorgio Vasari wrote of David, "Whoever has seen this work need not trouble to see any other work executed in sculpture, either in our own or in other times" (Puchko, K. 2015). Curiously, the piece of marble (known as the 'giant' for its large size) that was ultimately used to create the statue of David had been twice discarded by other sculptors and was laid to weather for almost 50 years. Renaissance Artist/ Sculptor Antonio Rossellino "took a crack at the block but decided it was too much of a pain to work with" (Puchko, K. 2015). If not for Michelangelo, this awkward and flawed rock would never have been brought to life in the form of 'David'.

Even the most revered piece of sculpture in living memory is not without its apparent faults. David possesses certain anatomical imperfections. His right hand is significantly bigger than his left and his right and left eyes deviate unconventionally.

There is much we can all learn from Michelangelo's 'David'. For parents and teachers it serves to remind us to be patient and chip away at the imperfections in our boy's. Yes, at times they can be a 'pain to work with' but each is special, unique and a work of Art that we all help to shape. And for our boy's, 'David' is not perfect and perfection alone should never be your goal. It is 'David's imperfections that make him so special. So don't get hung up on flaws but rather, embrace your gifts and talents that are emerging. And remember, sometimes it takes many attempts before our true gifts and talents are revealed so be persistent and keep chipping away to reveal the Art that lies within.

There isn't a week that goes by at St Josephs that doesn't have many learning: Assemblies, Year 7 Retreats, Year 7 & 8 Public Speaking Competition Year 7 – 9 ACC competitions (including a very impressive Year 8 Cricket win against all odds!), Year 8 Four Seasons -Bike Riding, Year 8 Camps at Kilth Kiln Regional Park, Year 9 Market Day, Year 9 'Smart-Generation' Evening at Valdocco amongst many other highlights.





The boys finished their first retreat at St Joseph's College during Term 4. Retreats are a large part of College life and each year the boys will engage in at least one of them. Valdocco

One of the highlights of the Valdocco experience each year is the Market Day run by our students in Term Four as part of their Thematic Studies Program.

In preparation for the Market Day the year nine cohort all visited the Queen Victoria Market on the first Friday of Term Four where students engaged in a range of activities designed to give them insights into the running of a market stall, as well as marketing strategies and an understanding of the concepts of profit margins and expenses.

The next step in market preparation was for each student to create a proposal for a crat product, food or novelty game for our market day. These proposals were to include a detailed break down of all expenses per unit and total, a marketing strategy and example of a promotional poster, and a forecast of gross and net profit per item and in total. Each of these proposals were presented to their classmates and many boys brought in samples of their product to be enjoyed. Each homeroom then made a decision of which products, foods and novelty games would be run by the homeroom on market day. Once these decisions were made, groups were formed and within each group every student was allocated with their set of responsibilities for preparation for market day and tasks on market day.

For staff and the many students who volunteered, Market Day started very early with the set up of gazebos, tables, barbeques and displays. Though a bit daunting, forecast of heavy rain, cold temperatures and strong winds did not deter the teams as they set up. After four hours of setting up, the market was ready to open up at 10:00am and one could sense the excitement and energy as the first customers, some brave family members undaunted by the inclement weather conditions arrived. From this point on, the market area was buzzing with a hive of activity. This year our food stalls included: French themed pastries, Greek styled souvlakis and koftas, U.S. fast food such as burgers and fries, Italian style pizzas, Hawaiian themed smoothies, Mexican nachos and fried corn and an Aussie BBQ. Icecream sundaes, milk shakes and soft drinks and other sweet treats were also available. Novelty games included: Mario kart, soft drink pong, nerf shoot a target, lolly guessing, the Tour d'Valdocco bike race and basketball hoop games.

Another highlight of the market was the marvellous displays of the year nine students' personal projects in the Valdocco meeting room. The variety and complexity of the many projects on display was a real credit to our students who had designed and created these projects over the entire year.

While it did rain on and off over the market day, everyone running their stalls adapted well and the weather was kind enough to not rain when it came time for pack up and clean up. As with the rest of the day, students and staff involved themselves enthusiastically into the pack up process and all were able to leave at the end of the day feeling quite contented that we had provided the school community with a great day.

I am very proud of the way the students and staff prepared for, ran and cleaned up after this year's market day and take this opportunity to again thank them for their outstanding achievements.

Smart Generation

As the year comes to a close at Valdocco and the cohort is about to move back to Main Campus and into Senior School, the Year 9s continue to impress in their development as Good, Strong and Gentle Young men with great character and want to expand themselves both within and outside the College.



One such opportunity that has become an annual event at Valdocco has been the Smart Generation program. Beginning in 2015, this program works in partnership with the Communities that Care team at Knox Council along with the support of Deakin University to highlight the issue of teenage-drinking and create an initiative that looks to quell this problem within our community. The fantastic thing about this program, most importantly, other than its intentions, is that the students of Year 9 take on the challenge of running a parent information evening at the end of the program to engage parents and the community about how they can be an asset to solving this community issue.

The SRCs at Year 9 took up the challenge over 3 phases to be able to achieve this which included:

- 1. Working through a leadership workshop to develop their skills to convey their knowledge, points of view and message to their cohort and parents.
- 2. Completing two different Smart Generation Student sessions where they engaged the boys about Teenagedrinking, why it occurs and how we can help reduce and then stop it.
- 3. Completing the parent information evening that occurred on Wednesday 13 November.

The Parent Night was held at the Valdocco Campus where the parents were catered for with Year 9 made pizzas from our own pizza oven as well as Mr Tucker's famous mock-tails which have been a staple of the last few versions of the night. Parents were provided opportunities to participate in activates such as role-playing situations they might find themselves in when discussing alcohol with their sons as well as a quiz to see how much they had taken away from the evening as well.

The SRCs showed great commitment, initiative and a conscientious nature throughout the program and to be able to present the whole night on their own, with a guest speaker included, really does show what a great cohort the Year 9s have been. It also shows that they are ready to enter Senior School as the next generation of leaders at the College and continue on a path to being Young men who care for one another and the community around them.

The boys certainly showed their wares as a leadership group but the guidance and advice of Valdocco teacher, Ms April Rogers, was certainly a massive factor in their ability to execute the program in the manner that they did and the commitment she showed to them exemplifies the attitude of the teachers at St Joseph's towards the cohort as well.

The boys now turn their focus to the Senior School, ready to take on the new challenges and exciting opportunities that await them.

With staff members from a wide range of faculty areas (including Mr Harvey – Science Leader and Mr Barr – Maths Leader) and students from Years 7 to 11, our group is one that welcomes all and any kind of reader.

As an English teacher at the school, it has been incredible to bump into students from the Book Club in the yard and discuss the next book, or what we are currently reading.

Here is what one student had to say:

"I love reading; absolutely adore it and one of my favourite extra-curricular activities is meeting up with the Book Club over take out and soft drink to talk about whatever book we read at the time. The most recent book was "The Secret Runners of New York" by Mathew Reilly. I loved his different take on time travel, and how he approached humanity's reaction to their imminent extinction. I believe he perfectly captures how people would react in that situation. Humanity collectively mocks the scientist who discovered the extinction event (a gamma cloud), ridiculing his discovery and writing it off as another doomsday prophecy, only to quietly prepare for the event or purchase multimillion-dollar tickets to a safety island. Mr Guido Piotti - Frankissstein By Jeanette Winterson

Written to honour the 200th anniversary of Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein*, Jeanette Winterson's *Frankissstein* (2019) is a dual narrative. *Frankissstein* switches between the life of the young Mary Shelley in 1816 as she created her masterpiece, and the uncomfortably familiar near future where genetics and information technology have converged to begin redefining what it is to be human. A smart and often funny novel that challenges us about our notions of humanity, intelligence, gender and politics, *Frankissstein* is that rare thing: great literature that is at the same time a page-turner.

Mr Louis Goutos - No Friend But The Mountains by Behrouz Boochani

I felt deeply compelled to read the traumatic and deeply moving story of Behrouz Boochani well before I had heard of title of this text or seen its front cover. Very rarely does a book come with the accolade of Australia's highest literary prize whilst carrying the burden of Australia's asylum seeker policy within its pages, but this book does and deservedly so. Although this series of autobiographical writings tells the unfortunate yet familiar journey of an asylum seeker risking their life for a new beginning on our shores, this is no typical refugee recollection. From his persecution as an outspoken Kurdish journalist in Iran to risking his life in the hands of people smugglers, to his resettlement to Manus Island, this is a story of unimaginable courage and bravery. And yet, what is most incredible about this text is it was "written" on WhatsApp, on multiple phones that had been smuggled into the prison in exchange for clothes, food and cigarettes. Like many, I was introduced to Behrouz Boochani's Australian Story earlier this year and haven't put it down ever since. His story moved us as a staff so much that we decided to include it this year as an additional text to our Year nine curriculum. What makes this book so moving is not its contents, or how it was written, but that it spreads the loudest message of courage and bravery while its author remains

imprisoned on Manus Island. This is not a book only for readers, or those interested in asylum seekers stories. This is a book for human beings everywhere who feel for other human beings, anywhere. Go and read it. Now.

Ms Marian Spires - Hag-seed by Margaret Atwood and Wolfe Island by Lucy Treloar

Hag-seed, Margaret Atwood

A retelling of Shakespeare's The Tempest. Felix Phillip is the much lauded avante garde director of the Makeshiweg Festival (Canada). A series of tragedies cause him to be ousted from this role and his life. He reinvents himself as a drama teacher in a correctional facility, where he discovers the means for his revenge against those who had thwarted him. I enjoyed Atwood's nod to the Bard and her crafting of these parallel stories.

Wolfe Island, Lucy Treloar

A 'not too distant' glimpse into the future where sea levels have risen slowly to cover one island after another in Chesapeake Bay. Found object artist Kitty Hawke is the last on Wolf Island, where her ancestors have lived for years. It was a slow first third (perhaps to echo the flooding of the landscape) but then I became immersed in Kitty's journey as she becomes caught up in helping refugees flees 'to the north' (Canada, I'm assuming). Treloar writes evocatively on landscape but also charts the choppy waters of family relationships.



Mr Andrew Cooper - Pillars of the Earth by Ken Follett

'Pillars' is a historical novel by author Ken Follett that follows the life journey of 'Tom Builder' and his family during the 12th Century. Tom is an illiterate but clever man with particular skill as an architect and builder of Cathedrals. The 12th Century is a particularly turbulent time in English history and also a particularly prominent time for Cathedral building. The novel follow's Tom's life with its many ups and downs, heroes and villains. A great read.

Mr Nick Harvey - Digital Minimalism: Choosing a focused life in a noisy world by Cal Newport



The central message about making conscious choices about where to put my attention really resonated with me. In addition to being a teacher, I am a new father to my second child, and there are only so many hours in a day. 
Mr Craig Buys - The Snow Leopard by Peter Mattiessen







Played this year in Melbourne, our boys enjoyed a great week both on and off the court, highlighted by the performance of our Senior team.

After winning their first two Pool games convincingly, losses in their next two had our boys finish 4th in the Pool. This meant a Quarter Final matchup with Flinders College (VIC), who were undefeated and on top of the other Pool. Against all odds, having only 6 available players, this impressive group left it all on the floor to come away with not only the win but also the confidence and belief that they could go all the way. A big win over St Ignatius' Riverview (NSW) in the Semi Final setup the Grand Final with Newington. In a relatively low scoring game, our boys made a great run at the beginning of the fourth quarter to build a game-winning margin that we would defend to the final buzzer, taking the win 49-42. A special mention to our graduating Year 12 students, Sebastian Boyce, Lachlan Dowell, Nathan Hare, Randy Saraw and Christopher Westcott for their outstanding commitment over 6 years at the College.



Intermediates (U17) - Division 1 7th Place

This year's U17 Division 1 Competition was quite possibly the most competitive and talented collection of school teams in the tournament's history, featuring 16 teams across four Pools. Our boys made a great start, finishing on top of their Pool undefeated. They advanced through the Round of 16 comfortably but suffered a disappointing loss in their Quarter Final to Westfield Sports High (NSW), which saw them bow out of medal contention.
