The Secret of Carter's Success

In Week 4 we held our first Whole School Assembly of the year where, among other things, we celebrated our high achieving students of 2017. It was great seeing some of our boys back to meet the St Joseph's community, and particularly hearing from Carter Hills, Dux of 2017 with an ATAR of 99.55.



Carter addressed the community in his Dux's speech, demonstrating his deep affection for St Joseph's College and giving an insight into the secret of his success to the current students.

It may come as a bit of a surprise that Carter attributed his success firstly not to himself, but to others. He said:



First of all, I'd like to highlight the ongoing support that my family, friends and the College offered through my entire schooling, particularly Year 12. It sounds really cliché, but in all honesty the educational journey is one that cannot be done alone, and although all of my Year 12 teachers are actually no longer here at the College, my relationships with staff members here were undoubtedly key to my own and many others' success.

So, according to Carter, the most successful student of 2017 and one of the most successful students in St Joseph's more than fifty years of history, success is about other people and, we need other people for us to be the best we can be: *the educational journey is one that cannot be*

done alone. As St John Bosco told us over 150 years ago, and Carter told us a few days ago, relationships are the 'key' to success.

Carter also stressed the point that success is a journey, coming to fruition in Year 12, but seeded long before, as he illustrated when he singled out his Year 7 teacher: *I'd like to thank Mr Di Donato who as my Year 7 teacher inspired me to achieve my academic best and was always there for me throughout the years.*

Carter sees success as a personal journey, a challenge against oneself:

Success differs from person to person, and one grade, score, or ranking can mean very different things to different people. In order to succeed, you ultimately have to surpass your own personal expectations, and at the end of it all, know that you achieved what you set out to do; that's what true satisfaction and success is.

In keeping with his beliefs about success, Carter advocates the formation of a personal goal around success, a destination for the end of the journey, one that helps us chart our course:

Have a goal, one that you are unequivocally passionate about, and work towards it. Simple, I know. The reason I say this is because neither I nor any of the other members of the Class of 2017 standing up here with me happened to stumble across success. Instead, our success was the fruit of an initial, individual goal that came together with every SAC grade, practice exam and final exam performance culminating with a combination of study scores.

Carter also spoke about the power of motivation, something that comes from within, rather than something imposed from without.

After all, that goal needs to be what motivates and drives you to study, and it needs to mean a lot to you. Otherwise why would you put in the work?



The use of time is critical to success, and Carter offered this:

It's about how you spend your time, not how much time you spend...

Furthermore, the way in which you divide your revision time is also imperative; the top students didn't spend countless hours every night mindlessly flicking through textbook questions, rewriting notes and sacrificing their social lives searching for a high ATAR, but rather spent time completing focussed tasks that improve their weak areas and occasionally practicing their strengths. As difficult as it might be, working hard on your weaker subjects will pay dividends come results day.

He also stresses the importance of achieving balance, and management of time is vital to this:

Your time, which can quickly become very valuable, needs to be filled with a balanced lifestyle, consisting of both relaxation, and study.

To the Year 12s this year aiming high: don't think that you need to commit your whole life to achieving a good score. There comes a point where too much study can be detrimental to your marks, and, critically, your health. Listen to your body and follow your impulses.

Carter's final advice about success is about self-belief, something born of continuously exposing oneself to things that inspire and motivate and to be with people who will provide constant support:

The one thing that matters when it comes down to it is to have confidence in yourself. I know that it is much easier said than done but exposing yourself to things that inspire and motivate you and surrounding yourself with people who believe in you for every step of the way is really the best way to pump up your confidence and thus elevate your performance during SACs and exams. This confidence is essential to staying calm and efficiently recalling and producing information when under pressure, and once developed will help you in every step as you advance through life. To the Year 12s again, that's really the best advice I can give, you have to be your own biggest fan, and don't question yourself or your efforts, trust that you've done everything you can to prepare. If you can overcome this mental obstacle you're already over halfway to achieving your goals.

So what is the secret to success according to Carter Hills, Dux of St Joseph's College?

Support from others - family, friends, school.

Relationships.

Success is part of an ongoing journey.

Success is about overcoming personal challenges.

Motivation is a key to success and comes from within.

Manage your time well – be creative and constructive in how you use it.

Find balance.

Believe in yourself, seek out positive experiences and positive people.

Finally, I would like to thank Carter for the insights he gave us into how he achieved his success, and wish him and all of the members of the class of 2017 every good fortune as they continue on to this next phase of their journey.


Prayer



This time of year seems to always have the same soothing feeling. As we move into the halfway point of the first term, the dust of transition begins to settle and all the little pieces fall into place. The long summer break allows for rest and rejuvenation leading into a new year, bringing with it a fresh set of opportunities and challenges. Although the main aim of our Kokoda days are to prepare our students for the rigors of our upcoming Mt Baw Baw expedition, these days always provide far more than that. Through group hikes, food preparation and team building activities, students develop vital life skills and for some, provide opportunities to engage in thinking and practice completely foreign to them thus far. To watch students cooperate to



finish a challenging task and collaborate to reach a common goal this early in the year, not only strengthens bonds with their peers but fast tracks their transition into Year 9 and builds their sense of belonging to their new home. A truly invaluable combination.

As the first school month of 2018 closes and the mid way point of the term is upon us, it is vital we all stop and think about what has been already achieved. To walk around our campus now is to see dynamic lessons being taught, meaningful discussion being had, practical objects being built and essential problems being solved. 'ARVO' Study

Year 10's have started Term 1 exceptionally well. Whilst the change from Valdocco to Senior School can be a rocky and emotional transition the boys have so far made this transition with ease. They have also been taking up learning opportunities and making good study habits by utilising many of the resources available such as staying back and contacting teachers.



One of the study resources that the boys have been utilising is the ARVO Study Program (Afternoon Re-Vision and Organisation). This is a program that you can encourage your sons to attend if you feel that they need a little extra help. This takes place Monday to Thursdays after school in Room 47 (3.20–4pm). Mr Fay, other Year 10 staff members and I are there to offer help with English, Mathematics, Religious Education, Science and basic study skills. This is essentially the Year 10 equivalent of the Valdocco Homework Help program.

A Year 10 student would like to share their experiences in ARVO Study:

"It's great to have ARVO Study because it is a place to go after school and catch up on homework or any work you missed in class. I found trying to do homework at home is hard as I don't get into the right frame of mind to do the work. With homework club I get all my work done and there is always a Maths and English teacher there willing to help if you get stuck".



 discuss the options to do homework at home, at Chieri (library) or at an afterschool program (VCE Centre).
- Discuss with your son events going on at the College, encourage your child to participate in school activities.


