Year 11: The Middle Year

Last time we looked at Year 10, the Pathways Year. This time, it is the turn of Year 11, the Middle Year.

When I was a boy, I would race home from school so that I could jump on to the couch and watch *Get Smart* and then *The Brady Bunch* before dinner. *The Brady Bunch* was especially interesting because of one character in particular: Jan Brady.



The epitome of the middle child, Jan was forever caught in the middle, not as important as her older sister and not as adored as her younger one.

Wedged between the seriousness of Year 12 and the newness of Year 10, Year 11 is the same as Jan Brady: the middle child. And yet, just as with Jan, we ignore the middle child of the Senior School, Year 11, at our peril.

In *The Brady Bunch* Jan proved herself to be the most interesting of the children. She was unique. She was adventurous and, when things went wrong, she took responsibility and tried to fix them. She was aware of her strengths, and the areas needing attention and, most importantly, she took steps to address them. Year 11 should be exactly the same.

The biggest mistake many students – as well as many parents and teachers – make regarding Year 11 is thinking that it is a bit of a non-year, a waiting room or departure lounge where nothing really exciting happens until the real journey begins. Rather than a year where nothing occurs, it should be a dynamic year of growth and achievement. Students who take Year 11 for granted and do not



tap into its possibilities make it harder for themselves to achieve their total potential in Year 12.

Year 12 is a year that decides so much, but it is a year of consolidation rather than foundation. It is a year of blossoming, but the seeding happens long before. Year 11 is a preparatory year of vital importance, one that can set up a successful and rewarding VCE or VCAL campaign. Year 11 is the year when students develop the foundation skills for Year 12, when the bulk of the knowledge for their subjects is developed.

More importantly, Year 11 is the year when the students learn about *how* they learn, about what study strategies and approaches work for them. This is the year when students can take some risks with their learning, trying different strategies and styles until they find the most effective one for them. It is here that students understand their learning and their goals and that they begin to take responsibility for them.

For VCE students, this is the year to make those last explorations of possible careers before they lock themselves into the inflexible subjects of Year 12, while for VCAL students it is a time to sharpen their focus on exactly where they see their career going. For all Year 11 students, this is a time when the mapping of their future starts to take on some solidity.

So, like Jan Brady, Year 11 is complex and fascinating. It is a year to be encouraged and celebrated. Rather than some uneventful holding pattern between journey and destination, Year 11 is equally part of both and thus unique. This middle year – like a middle child – needs to be taken seriously, to be given its share of attention and encouragement, and to be cherished.

Academic Outcomes, whilst revealing and hopefully affirming of a good semester's effort, are simply a signpost of where your son is at this given time in his learning journey. They are not a 'fixed' indicator of ability and should not be reviewed as such. A student who identifies his ability as a learner on the basis of one set of data is at risk of under-estimating his potential for excellence or the importance of growth-minded work habits.

To improve Outcomes a student needs to improve his work habits and develop his subject skills. Parents and students are encouraged to focus on these areas in their discussions and, in consultation with teachers, develop a learning plan to maintain or attain high standards in work habits and subject skills in Semester Two. The key to this plan is not only working hard but also working smart.

Contact with Your Son's Teachers

Parent Teacher Student Conferences are an opportunity to collaborate on improving student performance. However, discussions with teachers are not limited to these structured interviews. Parents are encouraged to contact teachers for clarification, advice or to provide information to teachers that can assist the school in supporting your son. This can be done informally through email (or phone) or more formally by arranging interviews at a time mutually convenient. Staff email addresses are first initial and surname followed by @stjosephs.com.au (example: acooper@stjosephs.com.au).

It is important that the College has the most up to date contact information about our students. Japan Study Tour 2019

Dear Parents and Students

The College will once again be conducting its biennial Japan Study Tour in 2019. The tour is open to all students in Years 9 to 12 (2019). Places are limited and preference is given to students studying Japanese Language.

The study tour will takes place in September 2019 (Wednesday 25 September to Wednesday 9 October (subject to flight availability).

Tour highlights include

- 3 nights in **Tokyo** with visits to significant cultural sites (temples & castles etc), markets & sumo wrestling
- 4 nights Homestay in Tsukuba (staying with Meikei College students and their families) including two days of school-based activities
- 1 night in Hiroshima including a visit to the Hiroshima Peace Park and Museum
- 1 night **Miyajima Island** staying at the Seaside Resort, participating in cultural activities including Momiji-Manju Making, cable car experience etc
- 1 night Mt Fuji (an addition to the 2019 tour itinerary)
- 4 nights in Kyoto with visits to significant cultural sites (temples & castles etc), Universal Studios, Maiko Experience etc

Student accommodation during the tour includes experiences of both Western and traditional Japanese style rooms. Food experiences are also varied and will include a very special Japanese banquet reception at the **Miyajima Island Resort**.

Final tour costs are expected to be around \$5,200.00 and includes flights (Qantas), travel expenses in Japan (including Japan Rail Pass, coach transport etc), travel insurance, all entrance fees and meals (with exception of meals at airports). The only additional costs to families will be student spending money.

Expressions of interest are required by 20 August, 2018 (see attached form).

To reserve a place on the tour, a deposit of \$1000 will be required by 8 October 2018.



With school holidays upon us, it is a timely opportunity to encourage all students to make sure that they spend their time in a way that will benefit them come Term 3.

For our VCE students in Years 11 and 12, that will mean finding that sweet spot between having a break and making sure their batteries are recharged for another ten-week block of studies, as well as juggling their study commitments which will demand that some of their time away from classes be spent consolidating content that has been taught, as well as doing pre-learning activities like set readings.

For younger students in the College is a great time to have a break from most studies for a couple of weeks, certainly from the rigor of day to day school life. I would strongly encourage that those students who don't have much study to do over their break ensure they are spending some time reading a book or two. The links between reading outside of school and performing well academically are clear. I would encourage all of our students to take the time over their break to continue being avid readers or to re-discover what it is like to get lost in a good book.

Year 7

What's the Chance?

With many other year levels completing their mid-year exams we have now moved into the second semester of work in Year 7. Here is an update of what has been happening and what we will be doing in the classroom.





In Maths classes the boys have worked through statistics and probability. This has included finding the mean, median, mode and range of different data sets and hopefully has sparked their interest in data analysis. The boys were able to make the link between viewing sports and games and how data and statistics can be used to analyse performances. We have built on this over the last couple of weeks of school with the boys looking at probability and chance as well.

In English the boys have started reading the novel 'Black Snake: The Daring of Ned Kelly'. We look forward to getting into the competition that runs throughout Term 3 in this English unit with more information to come. Boys have completed a range of tasks in the past and it gives everyone an opportunity to work in different ways with more freedom.

Humanities will have the boys reflecting upon living conditions and what makes a place more or less liveable than another. They get to discover the economic, environmental and social reasons that can influence the liveability of a place. Hopefully they learn how important family and support networks are in making their living conditions better.

In Science we also had the chance to use simple machines in a practical way until the end of term. The boys got the chance to apply what they have learned about simple machines to look at how they give us a mechanical advantage. We will also move into work on ecosystems shortly as well with an excursion next term to Ferny Creek, which runs by the school and will aid the boys' learning on the subject.

Preparing for Semester Two

It may be hard to believe but the end of this term marks the quarter way mark in our Year 8 students' St Joseph's College experience. With this new term and new semester students have been given a time to reflect. At our most recent Year Level Assembly students reflected on their learning, identified the obstacles to their learning and then set three goals for Semester Two.



Students' goals needed to contain two things. A time by which the goals would be met and a measurable target. Thus, it was not enough to say "I will be better at maths" but more accurately, "I will aim to improve my maths score by 10% on my next test."

Students then needed to think of a strategy for how they can change their work habits to help them meet these goals.

Students have attached their goals to the inside of their lockers where they can look at them daily and reflect on how they are going towards achieving them.

Year 8 students sat their first exams in English and Mathematics. As discussed with students, the most important part of these exams was for your son to experience the process and react accordingly. Ms Jacqui Cooke and I were very proud of the way the boys conducted themselves in this formal situation. The boys rose to the occasion, applied themselves to the task and worked solidly and quietly for the 80 minutes set. We hope this experience will make things easier for the boys in future years.

Year 10

On Thursday 7 June, *Chieri* was transformed into an exhibition and presentation space as over 100 excited community members gathered for the Lighthouse Expo Evening. The evening was a great success, and reflected the strong community links between St Joseph's College and the local dedicated Catholic primary schools that were involved in the program this year.



The Lighthouse Program has been in operation for a number of years, and was developed in conjunction with a cluster of Catholic primary schools in the local area. The development and implementation of the literacy mentoring program provides schools in the cluster with a practical program to assist in the social emotional literacy development of boys, with a strong focus to equip the College's most proficient Year 10 students with teaching skills in order to work with Year 5 and 6 boys in various aspects of literacy development. The Lighthouse Program is by selection only and is based on a Year 10 student's level of academic literacy, emotional maturity and specific literacy skills. Students who participate in the Lighthouse Program have the chance to develop their leadership skills and are held in high regard as ambassadors for the College.

During their Term 1 classes, our Year 10 students developed skills in mentoring and also learnt how to become effective teachers and communicators, developing a strong understanding of how to teach a range of literacy skills. In Term 2, students spent two hours a week visiting their primary school and working with a small group of students on developing a particular literacy project. The Expo Evening acknowledged each student's participation in this project, and was an opportunity to view and present the different projects that the students had been working on.





Examinations also took place, where students were required to put what they had learnt into practice. Our expectations of the students during exam time were high. They were expected to follow Senior School rules, organise exam clashes and seek out teachers for assistance. Students not only lived up to these expectations, they exceeded them and should be commended with how they conducted themselves during exam time.

Students have now commenced Semester Two subjects and are encouraged to start a fresh and set some goals achievable goals that they can put into place.


Year 12 Analytical Chemistry Excursion




On Friday June 22, the Year 12 Chemistry class visited the analytical chemistry laboratories at the University of Melbourne. As part of their studies into Organic Chemistry, they learn about the different techniques scientists use to analyse and categorise different chemical compounds. These techniques

include Infrared Spectroscopy, Nuclear Magnetic Resonance Spectroscopy and Mass Spectroscopy. These techniques are used by labs to identify unknown compounds, for example in forensic investigations, or to identify drugs in samples from athletes, as well as by

chemists trying to develop new compounds. The actual machines are highly specialised and, due to their prohibitive cost, are only found in universities.
