Examination Time

And just like that, the examinations are upon us.

Thirteen years of schooling. Years of young boys carrying loaded packs through all kinds of weather to get to school. Years of homework and study and mad rushes to finish assignments. Years of obsessive dads working through the night to build the right model for that special project. Years of watching the clock hand hit that three on the clock face with a preternatural slowness that could exist only in a hot classroom during a Friday afternoon maths class.

Thirteen years of schooling come to this. Examinations.

Examinations are not the fairest way to test someone's learning, but they are what we are faced with, as is every other student in the state. So if something can ironically be fair only because it is equally unfair to everyone, then examinations are one of these.

Fortunately, the boys at St Joseph's College are well prepared for the examinations. Teaching the Year 12 students are some of the best teachers I have ever worked alongside. They are experienced teachers of boys, well-qualified in their areas, and experienced at VCE. Many are VCAA assessors, with many on exam writing and course writing panels. They are well-versed in preparing students for examinations to the point where the boys are confident and capable students.

In addition to this, a tradition of examination preparation has provided the students with an examination stamina rarely seen in other schools. In the Junior School, as well as the NAPLAN, students undertake regular ACER testing and Semester Tests all taken in examination conditions. When the students get to Valdocco they have their first taste of extended examinations. Instructed in examination literacy and technique by their teachers, by the time these students get to Year 10, they are seasoned examination performers. In the meantime, at other schools, students may be having their first examination ever at the end of Year 10. Year 11 sees the introduction to full VCAA style examinations, with them mirroring the examinations of their Year 12 counterparts. By the time St Joseph's students start Year 12 they have completed almost 50 examinations. By the end of Year 12 they are near 100. The work of the previous years of education, together with a Year 12 year scattered with practice exams, trial exams, exam condition SACs, all combine to prepare the Year 12 students for the examinations in the best possible way.

The rest, of course, was up to them.

The Many Benefits of Studying a Second Language

Despite a growing demand for bilingual skills, the number of students completing a Language study in Australia has fallen significantly in recent decades. A 2016 study undertaken by the Foundation of Young Australians found a 181 per cent increase in demand for bilingual skills across over four million job advertisements they audited. The combination of less students undertaking language studies and increasing demand for language skills firmly places students studying languages at a significant advantage.



Whilst every student can benefit from Language studies it is not necessarily the best fit for every boy. Like most boys' schools, St Joseph's offers Language Studies as an optional study from Year 9 onwards. Two studies are offered; Japanese Language and Italian. From Year 9 onwards these studies are delivered through the VET Applied Languages curriculum (concluding with the Certificate III at Year 11). The benefit of this curriculum is that it supports the delivery of Language studies in a dynamic, engaging and applied manner. The program includes many excursions as well as practical activities that explore both the language and the culture of Italy and Japan.

A significant added benefit of the VET Applied Languages curriculum is that it is assessed through competency attainment rather than through external examinations, yet it contributes to the Year 12 final study score! Students are 'awarded' for studying a VET Applied Language course with a score bonus towards their final VCE score (even though the course is completed in Year 11). The aggregate score for a VCE student is made of combining the top four Unit 3 & 4 VCE study scores for the student with ten per cent of any fifth and sixth study undertaken (most students complete five Unit 3 & 4 VCE studies). A VET Applied Language study student receives the equivalent of 10% of the average score of his top four Unit 3 & 4 studies. This is the highest fifth study score available! Completing the study in Year 11 also means that language students can in fact complete six studies and maximise their VCE study score. VET Applied Languages has also transferable benefits to the VCAL program as well.

Whilst VET Applied Language studies from Year 9 to Year 11 have obvious benefits to VCE and VCAL studies, a study of any language has many far reaching benefits beyond course bonuses that may be available. In addition to the obvious Literary benefits of Language studies and increased employability opportunities, learning additional languages also helps develop in students a better empathy for other cultures and opens up opportunities to better explore the world in which we live.

To support students in developing their Language studies the school offers a number of International Study Tours and Immersion programs. These include:

- Kiribati Immersion (Year 11 students by selection).
- Cagliero Immersion to Samoa (Year 11 students by selection).
- Italy Study Tour (Biennial; next Tour 2020 open to Years 9 − 11).
- SOSEP Japan Immersion Program (two week immersion in Japan for two Year 10/11 students each year).
- Japan Study Tour (Biennial; next Tour 2019 open to Years 9 11 four places still available for 2019!).

Students undertaking a VET language Study are encouraged to undertake a study tour as part of their VET Language program (although it is not a requirement). Providing a dynamic and rich language and cultural experience, study tour costs are kept to a minimum to make it as affordable as possible. Places in the **2019 Japan Study Tour** are still available to any current Year 8 to 10 student undertaking Japanese study in 2019 (please contact me via accoper@stjosephs.com.au as soon as possible for further details). Applications for the 2020 Italy Study Tour will be made available early next year.

The benefits of undertaking a Language program are not always evident but are many.



MYSci is a three-day science program designed specifically for students in Years 11 and 12 in 2019 and includes workshops from Monash University's five Schools of Science; *Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Astronomy, Mathematics and Earth, Atmosphere and the Environment*.

The workshops will be run in Monash's teaching laboratories and outdoor science classrooms. Students will also have direct access to Monash University's research scientists who will provide an insight into their disciplines and provide students with potential career pathway information.

What is Cybersecurity?

Wikipedia defines cybersecurity or computer security as the protection of computer systems from theft or damage to their hardware, software or electronic data, as well as from disruption or misdirection of the services they provide.

Another explanation is that cybersecurity is the protection of internet-connected systems, including hardware, software and data, from cyberattacks. In a computing context, security comprises cybersecurity and physical security – both are used by enterprises to protect against unauthorised access to data centers and other computerised systems.



Cybersecurity professionals are employed in all industries, and they work hard at ensuring computer data stays out of the wrong hands.

Cybersecurity is taught at numerous universities in Victoria.

Although Cybersecurity Education is an American organisation, its website is well-worth a visit just to begin to grasp the broad range of careers in this field.



Postgraduate Master Programs in the Health Sciences

Swinburne University offers a range of Master programs in the Health Sciences.

Three such courses are profiled below.

Master of Counselling

The Master of Counselling provides students with a range of counselling skills that can be applied across work settings, client types and cultural groups. Students specialise in human services counselling, couple counselling or forensic counselling.

The entry requirement is a minimum three-year Bachelor's degree from an Australian university. While no specific area of study in the Bachelor's degree is required as a prerequisite, it would be advantageous for students to have experience in human services, couple counselling or a forensic setting.

This postgraduate course is an alternative for students who want to do counselling and do not, or cannot, go through post-graduate psychology.

Master of Dietetics

The Master of Dietetics will ensure students develop skills in both traditional and emerging areas of dietetic practice, and that they learn to work with a range of evolving food and health management strategies.

Units cover a range of innovative topics including entrepreneurship, leadership and business, sports nutrition, and paediatric nutrition.

Applicants who have completed a three-year Bachelor degree in a relevant area of study are eligible to apply, AND meet the following unit/subject pre-requisites (as required by the Dietitians Association of Australia Accreditation Standards for Dietetics Education Programs):

- a. Chemistry/Biochemistry, four units including Chemistry (equivalent to 25% of a year study load) followed by Biochemistry (equivalent to 25% of a year study load);
- b. Human Biology and Human Physiology, four units including Human Biology (equivalent to 25% of a year study load) followed by Human Physiology (equivalent to 25% of a year study load); and
- c. Food and Nutrition Science, two units (equivalent to 25% of a year study load).

Master of Occupational Therapy

The Master of OT provides students with skills and knowledge in treating clients who may have neurological, musculoskeletal or mental health issues. Clients have difficulty participating in everyday life activities such as working, self-care and engaging in leisure activities.

Applicants who have completed a three year degree in any area of study are eligible to apply if they obtained a minimum 65% GPA in their last year of study.





YHA Fact Sheet

YHA Australia is part of the world's largest backpacker accommodation network and has a very useful fact sheet for students going travelling or on working holidays. Below are some interesting travel tips for graduating Year 12 students.

Top Travel Tips

- 1. Want to earn money while you travel? Australia has working holiday agreements with many countries see www.immi.gov.au. Be aware that some visas must be applied for before you leave Australia though.
- 2. Make sure your passport is valid for at least six months after you plan to return, and check entry requirements for countries you plan to visit e.g. tourist visas, US pre-authorisation.
- 3. Visit the doctor at least six weeks before you leave to get vaccinations and prescription medication.
- 4. Let your bank know you're going overseas so they don't cancel your card when they see an overseas transaction.
- 5. If you can't afford travel insurance, you can't afford to travel!
- 6. Register with www.smartraveller.gov.au
- 7. Always give a family member or friend a copy of your itinerary so they can contact you in an emergency.
- 8. Book your first couple of nights' accommodation ahead for peace of mind when you get off the plane and have to find your way around a new city, a new country.
- 9. Always aim to arrive in a new town during the daylight hours as it is more difficult to get your bearings at night.
- 10. It can be cheaper to organise transport passes before you leave Australia, e.g.
- 11. Busabout hop-on hop-off between major European Cities, Greyhound Canada/USA, Eurail train network.
- 12. Pack lightly you'll be surprised how little you can comfortably travel with, and roll clothes when packing.
- 13. Sometimes the best plan is 'no plan'... don't be too locked into a pre-arranged schedule that you have no time for spontaneous experiences!
- 14. Look at alternative low-cost options to communicate with home email, SKYPE, Facebook, Facetime, WhatsApp, Viber, WeChat (on Wi-Fi or from an internet café), prepaid local or international SIM cards.

'FINAL BOARDING CALL' Japan Study Tour 2019

The College will, once again, be conducting its biennial Japan Study Tour in 2019. The tour is open to all <u>current</u> Years 8 to 11 students. There are limited places still available.

The study tour will takes place from Sunday 15 September to Tuesday 1 October 2019.

Tour highlights include

- Four nights in **Kyoto** with visits to significant cultural sites (temples and castles etc.), Universal Studios, Maiko Experience etc.
- Two nights in Hiroshima including a visit to the Hiroshima Peace Park and Museum.
- Day trip to Miyajima Island.



- Three nights in Tokyo with visits to significant cultural sites (temples and castles etc.), markets & sumo wrestling tournament.
- One night Mt Fuji.
- Four nights Homestay in **Tsukuba** (staying with Meikei College students and their families) including two days of school-based activities.







Final tour costs are expected to be around \$5,200 and include flights (Singapore Airlines), travel expenses in Japan (including Japan Rail Pass, coach transport etc.), travel insurance, all entrance fees and meals (with exception of meals at airports). The only additional costs to families will be student spending money.


