Student Leadership Team 2018

On Wednesday 11 October the members of the Student Leadership Team for 2018 were elected to their positions. With the assistance of our local MLAs, Mr Kim Wells and Mr Nick Wakeling, the elections were held on the floor of the Great Hall of the Legislative Council in State Parliament. This setting, together with the quality of the candidates' speeches, made for a day of inspirational discussion and reflection on leadership.

Each of the boys involved presented fine speeches. While each of the speeches were as diverse as the young men presenting them, there were some common elements. Each of the students spoke well and confidently, each had reflected on leadership and demonstrated a deep understanding of what was required, and each showed a profound love for the College. It was a very difficult task for the 26 students and five staff members to select each leader given the quality of the boys and their presentations.

The Leadership Day at Parliament House was the last phase in a leadership process that began much earlier. Year 11 students were addressed about leadership, had the positions available explained and were taken through the nomination and election process. Next, series of workshops were offered to aspirant leaders, workshops that were well attended despite their being after school. After this, students nominated for leadership, each nomination supported by a fellow student and teacher, and endorsed by the Principal, Ms Cathy Livingston. Following this process, all Year 11 students participated in the Year 11 Retreat, the focus of which was leadership. Finally, all the Year 11 students and the whole of the College staff voted to elect a core group of leaders who attended Parliament House to elect the boys to specific positions.

Preparing For Success - How Parents Can Assist Their Sons

Planning ahead is not generally one of those traits boys tend to exhibit in abundance. If it was, revisions of school work would be commonplace and academic excellence all but guaranteed. The reality is that a considerable amount of parenting and teaching time needs to be devoted to encouraging and cajoling our boys to put in the preparation for this success.

Despite the enormity of this task at times, we should never waver from our responsibility to support the boys to develop 'good habits of learning' when it comes to homework and revision. The teenage brain after all is 'under construction' and requires a good-deal of direction.

Parents have a big role to play in developing their son's good 'habits of learning'. Some things they can do include:

- for Literacy development: read your son's class texts (novels) and create your own family 'book club' by chatting about the book
- for Numeracy development: sit with him on occasion and do some of the tasks with him
- attend parent teacher interviews even if (and, in fact, particularly) if your son is demonstrating 'good practice'
- encourage your son to develop and stick to a study planner (his teachers have shown him how to create one)
- don't let him take short cuts in his learning. The most important indicator for success is actual attendance at school so encourage him to value these opportunities



Preparing For Success – 'Prescribed Reading' in Preparation of the 2018 School Year (Years 10-12)

To assist your sons' Literacy development, students in Year 10 to 12 (2018) are strongly encouraged to read their prescribed novels over the summer break. To facilitate this, the College will provide the Year 10 novels to the current Year 9s during the upcoming HeadStart program. For VCE students (2018), Campion Books provide the opportunity for parents to place an early order for all English Texts (including English Literature and English Language). The 'English Booklists' will be available in the upcoming week. All orders for English novels must be completed online (www.campion.com.au) by Monday 30 October. Early order books can be collected from the College on Monday 20 November between 8:45am – 9:30am (Room 45).

Semester Two Exams

Term 4 is a time when 'habits of learning' are assessed. Semester Two Exams commence for Year 12s in less than three weeks (Wednesday, 1 November). Year 11 (Monday, 13 November), Year 9 and 10 exams (Wednesday, 22



November) will start shortly after.

It is never too late to prepare for exams but more importantly, it is never too early!

Students should contact their respective Curriculum Leaders if they require any additional support with study planners and revisions strategies.

Year 7 – 12 (2018) HeadStart Program/Conclusion of 2017 Academic Year

For all our students, preparation for success next year begins this year!

All current students (Years 7-11) will undertake a HeadStart program in Term 4.

The HeadStart program is an opportunity for students to begin to negotiate the transition into the next year of their academic studies. Whilst it is an essential program for all students, providing an opportunity to meet their 2018 classroom teachers (where possible) and be introduced to the learning expectations for 2018, it is particularly vital for students undertaking VCE studies.

Students undertaking Year 12 in 2018 will have two weeks of Year 12 HeadStart (commencing Monday 20 November and concluding Friday 1 December, the final day of school for current Year 11s).

Whilst no VCAA scored assessment will be completed during HeadStart, Unit 3 studies will commence. (Note: Current Year 10 students completing an accelerated Unit 3 / 4 study in 2018 will be provided the opportunity to attend these classes).

HeadStart for Year 11 (2018) will commence at the conclusion of the Year 10 Exams, Tuesday 28 November.

Current Years 7 to 9 students will commence their HeadStart Programs (Year 8 to 10 2018) on Thursday 30 November (following the pupil free Correction Day – Wednesday 29 November). **HeadStart (and the 2017 school-year) concludes for all current Year 7 – 10 students on Friday 8 December at 3.10pm.**

Subject Selection 2018 (Years 10 to 12)

Your son will receive his subject allocations for 2018 in the coming weeks. Wherever possible, he has received his first selections. In some (rare) instances, lack of student numbers or timetable clashes may result in some necessary adjustments to his academic program for 2018. The process of subject selection is a fluid one and I welcome parents to contact your son's current Head of School with any queries or requests. The ideal situation is for your son to start HeadStart in the subjects he is suited to and comfortable with. Minimising movement from one subject to another within a school year is highly preferable for student success. Consequently, the HeadStart program time is the best time to 'tweak' any changes to course selection.

VCE Booklists 2018

VCE Booklists for 2018 will be made available in coming weeks. Campion books continue to be the preferred book supplier for the College.

Year 7 - 10 Booklists

As has been our practice in past years that prescribed texts (including iPad 'apps' and e-texts) are provided to all students as part of the school fee structure. Provision of stationery remains the responsibility of parents. A prescribed stationery list is provided from Campion books in coming weeks. Parents are not compelled to purchase stationery through Campion Book sellers.

Pizza lunches, selling cans of soft drink, guessing lollies in jars, were some of the initiatives that the students used to generate money and bring in donations to the

Our Appeal brought in a total of 6,694 donations of food items for St Vincent de Paul and we collected \$5,319.35, a combined tally of 12,013 donations and dollars.


A note of thanks to you and the students for your hard work yesterday with helping us load the cars with the food that the boys donated.




