




# **Principal**

#### Beginning With the End in Mind

Back in the late 1980s Stephen R. Covey published his famous business and self-help book, '*The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*'. Focussing on character traits rather than personality traits as many such books did at the time, Covey postulated seven desirable habits that successful leaders possessed. The second of those habits was "begin with the end in mind". This is a practical and powerful habit that crystallises for people the eventual outcome of their endeavour, and the pathway they need to follow in order to achieve it.

It is in the spirit of this habit, of beginning with the end in mind, that students have started undertaking the College's HeadStart Program. During these days, students participate in their 2018 classes with their 2018 teachers and their 2018 classmates. During the HeadStart Program, students are introduced to the subjects they are undertaking, the required tasks for assessment and the expected outcomes for those subjects. In many respects they are provided with a roadmap for success.

The Year 12 HeadStart Program started on Monday 20 November, with Year 11 students meeting their 2018 Year Level Coordinator, Ms Bantock, and then moving on to their classes. One of the focusses during this time has been to dispel some of the stress that naturally comes with a year as important as Year 12. Students were taken through the positive aspects of the coming year, and advised that thorough preparation and organisation would dissolve much of the stress.

The remainder of the College will commence its HeadStart Program on Thursday 30 November, with the entire school rolling over into 2018 mode. This is the first time the whole school has undertaken this venture, but the years of experience of the successful Year 12 HeadStart suggests that this will be a great success.

As with the Year 12s, the students from Years 8 to 11 will attend their 2018 classes alongside their 2018 teachers and classmates. This will be an opportunity for them understand the requirements of the coming year and to be comfortable with the inevitable changes of that year.

With the mystery of the coming year stripped away by the HeadStart Program all students should be able to begin the 2018 school year in a solid and confident manner, able to focus on their successful completion of that year, whether it be Year 8 or Year 12, thus beginning with the end in mind.

#### HeadStart Programs 2017

Year 12 HeadStart Program (Current Year 11s) – Monday 20 November to Friday 1 December *VCE* 

All current Year 11 students who are undertaking VCE (Unit 3 & 4) studies in 2018 have commenced those studies during the Year 12 HeadStart Program (Monday 20 November to Friday 1 December).



The HeadStart program is a vital component of Unit 3 & 4 studies. It provides students with the opportunity to prepare for the demands of Year 12 studies with a particular focus of the program on outlining expectations regarding subject-based assessments, study expectations and required readings etc.

Undertaken over a full timetable cycle (two weeks), students will commence all their Unit 3 & 4 subjects for up to 12 periods. Every effort will be made to make available to classes, their 2018 subject teacher. However there will be some instances where qualified substitutes will deliver the HeadStart program.

It is an expectation that students have purchased their novels for English studies (English, English Language, English Literature). These are available through Campion Books.

Students will require their MacBooks for HeadStart. They will have access to STILE as well as EdRolo (Revision resources). They will be required to wear full College summer uniform during this period.

Note: There is a Correction Day 29 November (Pupil Free).

#### Senior VCAL

All current Year 11 students who are undertaking Senior VCAL studies in 2018 have commenced those studies during the Year 12 HeadStart Program. Consistent with the school-based timetable for Senior VCAL, students had classes on Monday 20 November and Tuesday 21 November and will have classes on Monday 27 November and Tuesday 28 November.

Students will commence studies in Senior VCAL: Numeracy, Literacy, Work Related Skills and Personal Development Skills. They will be required to wear full College summer uniform during this period.

# <u>Year 11 HeadStart Program (Current Year 10s) – Thursday 30 November to Friday 8 December</u> *VCE*

All current Year 10 students who are undertaking VCE (Unit 1 & 2) studies in 2018 will commence those studies during the Year 11 HeadStart Program (Thursday 30 November to Friday 8 December).

The HeadStart program is a vital component of Unit 1 & 2 studies. It provides students with the opportunity to prepare for the demands of Year 11 studies with a particular focus of the program on outlining expectations regarding subject-based assessments, study expectations and required readings etc.

Students will require their MacBook's for HeadStart. They will have access to STILE as well as EdRolo (Revision resources). They will be required to wear full College summer uniform during this period.

Note: There is a **Correction Day** 29 November (Pupil Free).

#### Intermediate VCAL

All current Year 10 students who are undertaking Intermediate VCAL studies in 2018 will commence those studies during the Year 11 HeadStart Program (Friday 1 December to Friday 8 December). Consistent with the school-based timetable for Intermediate VCAL, students will have classes on:

- Friday 1 December
- Monday 4 December, Tuesday 5 December and Friday 8 December

Students will commence studies in Intermediate VCAL: Numeracy, Literacy, Certificate II in Business and Personal Development Skills. They will be required to wear full College summer uniform during this period.

<u>Year 8 – 10 HeadStart Program – Thursday November 30 to Friday December 8</u> Current Year 7 to Year 9 students will commence their HeadStart Programs on Thursday 30 November. The College



will be operating the 'new' 2018 timetable at this time. Following Year Level Assemblies, where they will meet their new coordinators, students will be directed to their new homerooms and classrooms and commence their 2018 program.

The HeadStart program is a vital component in preparing students for a smooth transition into their next year of studies. The program has a particular focus on outlining expectations regarding subject-based assessments, study expectations and required readings etc.

Students will be advised what materials they are required to bring each day, however all current Year 7 to 9 students are required to bring their iPads to HeadStart. They will be required to wear full College summer uniform during this period.

Note: There is a Correction Day 29 November (Pupil Free).

#### Year 11 and Year 10 Exams

By the time this Newsletter article is published all Year 11 and Year 10 students will have received copies of their end of year Exam Timetables via their student email. Students have also received a copy of the Exam Rules that their exams will be governed by.

It is critical that all students take the time to familiarise themselves with all exam rules so that they not find themselves in a situation whereby they are in breach of any rules. Students face very severe penalties for any breaches of rules ranging from a reprimand to a cancellation of a paper and loss of grades. The rules used in Year 11 and Year 10 exams mirror those set by the VCAA and used in all Year 12 exams. It is our hope that by exposing our students to these rules for a number of years prior to Year 12 it will aid them in becoming familiar with such exam conditions and hopefully allow students to perform better overall.

Any Year 10 student who is undertaking a Year 12 class in 2018 could have a clash between Year 12 HeadStart classes and a Year 10 Exam. A clash form will need to be filled and handed in to Ms Bantock (Year 10 Curriculum Leader) as attendance at Year 12 HeadStart will take precedence over a Year 10 exam if there is a clash.
